Mid-West Minutes

Informal Board of Directors Meeting December 20, 1985 Conrad Hilton and Towers Chicago, Illinois

In an effort to conserve travel expenses and to provide additional funds for other more important projects, no formal Board of Directors meeting was held in 1985. In its place an informal meeting of all board members present at the Mid-West Band and Orchestra Clinic convened at 10:00 a.m. on Friday, December 20th, to review the current status of all CBDNA operations.

The meeting was called to order by Don Hunsberger. Others present: J. Julian, Richard Strange, Richard Floyd, Allan McMurray, Craig Kirchhoff, Zeke Nicar, and Wayne Bennett.

Directory

Don Hunsberger announced that Mark Kelly had agreed to assume the responsibility of selling ads for the next Directory. Various details were discussed. It was agreed that the deadline for directory ads would be May, 1986. The Directory would be published on October 15 for distribution shortly thereafter. 1989 National Conference

J. Julian reported that plans for hosting the 1989 National Conference in Washington D.C. had not proven satisfactory. The 1989 Conference will be held at the University of Texas in Austin during late February.

Research Projects

Myron Welch requested input concerning the status of the CBDNA Research Program. It was agreed that projects should be solicited through the **Report** and other publications. The practice of providing time at all Conferences for Research Project reports will continue.

CBDNA Journal

The status of the **Journal** was discussed in much detail. Current cost is running approximately \$6,500 per issue. Don Hunsberger reported that Bob Reynolds has agreed to attempt to secure funding from outside sources to underwrite a portion of the production cost for future issues. Efforts to attract subscriptions from university libraries and individuals within the profession will be expanded.

Financial Report

Richard Floyd distributed the financial report and a summary of income and expenses for 1983-85. Time was provided for questions and discussion. Other Business

Myron Welch expressed concern regarding the quality of recordings at the 1985 National Conference. As in the past, all recording services were provided by Crest Records. After some discussion it was agreed that CBDNA should continue its relationship with Mack Wolfson and Crest Records, but that a more specific performance contract should exist in the future.

Zeke Nicar asked why no invoice was sent to the membership for '85-86 dues. Don Hunsberger explained that he had elected to solicit membership renewals through the **Report** rather than using a separate dues notice. It is hoped that this practice will be successful in securing renewals and reduce postal expenses.

Allan McMurray raised a question regarding the lack of information pertaining to the responsibilities of Division Presidents and Divisional Conference Hosts. It was agreed that misunderstandings have existed in the past because of this void. Don Hunsberger will review the current Guideline for Officers of CBDNA and then initiate a plan to develop a more specific document.

The meeting was adjourned at 11:45 am.

Frank Battisti outlined plans for the 1987 WASBE Conference that will take place in Boston. Lee Chrisman (Boston University) who will serve as Conference Host was introduced. The conference is scheduled for July 20-25.

Don Hunsberger introduced special guest Tim Reynish of Manchester, England who hosted the first International Conference organized by the

CBDNA.

J. Julian briefed the membership regarding the 1989 Conference to be held in February at the University of Texas in Austin.

Myron Welch gave an update on the status of

Research Projects.

Jerry Gardner expressed interest in developing a stronger relationship between KKY and CBDNA.

Don Hunsberger introduced all Divisional

Presidents and other officers.

The floor was open for questions and discussion. There being none, the meeting was adjourned at 4:45 pm.

From the Podium

Several Newsletters ago I discussed a topic which I feel is of utmost importance to the continuing development and welfare of CBDNA—communication—between members and especially between the National and Divisional Officer levels and the membership.

Most members of CBDNA attend Divisional and National gatherings for both intellectual and professional development, and for personal comraderie, a very important interchange among professional colleagues as many of us function in a singular status on our own campus. This opportunity to discuss similar situations, problems and solutions in a relaxed atmosphere is vital.

In an effort to gain a better feel for the organization and gain input from those who "people it" on all levels, I have made an attempt to attend each of the Divisional meetings these past two months. Unfortunately, my own Eastern Division meeting was held on the same weekend as the Northwest and North Central, so President-Elect Jay Julian covered that one for me. The Western Division will meet on the weekend just prior to the National MENC in Anaheim, so I still have that group to look forward to!

As one might expect from such a duo, the Southwest meeting under the leadership of President AI McMurray and Host Bob Foster at the University of Kansas produced a well organized meeting with stimulating panels, lectures and concerts. In addition to CBDNA, members of the NBA Southwest Division and the Kansas Bandmasters Association were invited for the joint meeting in Lawrence.

Southern President "Zeke" Nicar and Host John Demos provided a meeting which also included members of the Southern Division of NBA. As always, the warm Southern grace and style offered a stimulating and relaxed gathering at the Radisson Conference Center in Atlanta complete with excellent concerts and presentations culminating with a Georgia barbeque which was consumed during a Boston Pops style concert by the Oak Ridge Tennessee Community Band.

The North Central Division guided by President Craig Kirchhoff and hosted by Jim Smith at the University of Wisconsin-Madison was highly charged with excellent presentations on conducting, acoustics and tuning, and the music of Edgard Varése, interspersed with excellent concerts of Division bands and ensembles.

While we have come to expect most Divisions to produce conferences on a high level of quality with a respectable turnout of members, the Northwest Division really deserves an Award of Merit for its turnaround of a most dangerous set of circumstances over the past few years. At the last Divisional meeting there was a total of six members in attendance and, in the months following that meeting, there developed gaps in the officer structure which in effect left the Division in almost total disarray. Under the leadership of President Wayne Bennett, the Division is now back on its feet and over two dozen were in attendance at the Shoreline Community College where Barry Erlich hosted a great conference.

As stated elsewhere in this issue, the matter of Conference attendance and support is really an issue of concern. Practically all of the Divisions have great distances for members to travel and financial support is more difficult (or dried up!) for many of us; these factors, plus a personal evaluation of priorities, have produced inactivity on the part of many members regarding Conference participation. We are working to determine reasons for this inactivity and feelings of non-commitment and will address the matter both here and at Evanston.

What Dates Are Best?

An interesting subject discussed at several Divisional Meetings focused upon the **optimum annual schedule** for meeting of both the National and Divisional Conferences.

No one will deny that participation at both National and Divisional Conferences leaves something to be desired. When one figures the amount of personal time, effort, energy, administrative preparation, rehearsal and school expense that are invested in a tour culminating in a performance at a CBDNA meeting—a meeting where approximately less than 25% of the membership might be in attendance—one is always amazed (but grateful) at the fortitude of the brave souls who venture forth.

At the center of this dilemma lie several basic philosophic questions:

 Is poor attendance at Divisional meetings a result of late Conference planning and announcement? Are most calendars being set two or three years in advance?

 Should CBDNA establish a weekend that would remain constant each year for both National and Divisional meetings, a set of dates that could be locked into calendars for any number of future meetings? (e.g., the third weekend in February or the last weekend in March).

3. Or is the problem much deeper than merely establishing firm dates, which after a year or two, could become a prime commitment above all other conflicts? Is the real question simply apathy, lack of interest, lack of a feeling of "belonging" and involvement? You will soon have an opportunity to discuss these questions and offer your input into scheduling, priorities, society development, etc., through the CBDNA PROFILE QUESTIONNAIRE which will be sent to you next month. Your thoughts are important to the future well-being of CBDNA, so please use this opportunity to contribute your desires to the National Board.

Dello Joio Premiere

The College of St. Thomas—College of St. Catherine Concert Band of St. Paul, Minnesota (John P. Krebsbach, Conductor) premiered "Metaphrase on Lines from Shakespeare" by Norman Dello Joio on November 24, 1985. The performance was conducted by the composer.

"Metaphrase," commissioned by the College of St. Thomas to commemorate its centennial, derives its six-note theme from a quote in *Love's Labor's*

Lost:

"Venetia, Venetia, Chi monti vede non ti pretia. Old Mantuan, old Mantuan! Who understandeth thee not, Loves thee not. Ut, re, sol, la, mi, fa."

The 12-minute work is cast in two sections: Adagio and Allegro vivace. It calls for piccolo, flute, oboe, B-flat clarinets I-III, bass clarinet, bassoon, E-flat alto saxophones I-II, tenor saxophone, baritone saxophone, horns I-IV, B-flat trumpets I-III, trombones I-III, bass trombone, euphonium, tuba, snare drum, bass drum, cymbals, suspended cymbal, xylophone, glockenspiel, and chimes.

Dello Joio has submitted the score to Associated

Music (G. Schirmer) for publication.

Band Program Notes

Norman E. Smith, Ph. D. (Retired), co-author of **Band Music Notes** has announced that a new publication, **March Music Notes**, will be ready for distribution by the end of April. The book will contain biographies of 380 march composers and over 600 informative program notes explaining the reasons for the title, dedications, historical events of the time, and circumstances related to premiere performances.

"Let's Talk"

CBDNA is a paradox of sorts. As college and university band directors, we enjoy a considerable degree of independence in setting our own goals, defining our daily tasks, establishing our own policies and the like. In addition, we are often the ones to whom our public school colleagues turn for advice and assistance. For these and other reasons, including geographical ones, we may be so accustomed to our autonomy that we overlook the opportunities which CBDNA can provide for sharing and receiving ideas, for informing and becoming informed. Perhaps CBDNA is a paradox because it is like a vast nation of islands, independent yet united.

The CBDNA Report was conceived by President Hunsberger as the medium through which we can communicate regularly with one another. In order for it to succeed as such, we need to hear from members about their individual achievements and interests, about premieres and commissions, tours of particular interest, recordings, research projects, and so on. Articles would also be most welcome.

WASBE Meeting

WASBE, the World Association of Symphonic Bands and Ensembles, will hold its third World Conference in Boston, MA, July 20-25, 1987.

The Conference, formerly held in Skien, Norway and Kortijk, Belgium, will feature daily forums, performances by wind bands from around the world, presentations and clinics by distinguished composers, conductors, publishers and historians, panel discussions, exhibits and the opportunity to interact and share with musicians from other cultures and traditions.

Major ensembles that are scheduled to perform to date include The USAF Band conducted by Major J.M. Bankhead, The U.S. Marine Band conducted by Col. John R. Bourgeois, The Central Band of RAF (U.K.) conducted by Sq. Ldr. Eric Banks, The Northshore Community Band (U.S.A.) conducted by John Paynter, and the All Japan High School Band. A special concert will be given by the International High School Honors Wind Band, a select ensemble made up of high school aged students from the countries represented.

Mstislav Rostropovich (Slava), one of the world's outstanding cellists and currently the conductor of the National Symphony Orchestra (U.S.A.) will guest conduct the US Air Force Band in the premiere of a new work, while new compositions by Richard Rodney Bennett, Warren Benson, Clare Grundman and John Downing will also be premiered. Other composers from around the world will have prepared readings played by the US Air Force Band.

The Boston Cultural scene will be integrated into the week's activities, with outdoor concerts at Boston's famed Hatch Shell on the Charles River, a day trip to Tanglewood Music Center (Lenox, MA) to observe two special rehearsals of the Boston Symphony Orchestra and opportunities to take advantage of Boston's many museums and historical sites.

Housing will be available, as well as special airline flight rates to Boston.

CBDNA Members as Role Models

One subject discussed in the meetings I attended concerned the lack of college/university influence as leaders and role models in assisting and guiding band and orchestra activity on the secondary school level. We train the teachers who enter the field, and we are dependent upon their students for our ensembles' personnel, yet CBDNA has remained insular and detached from this level of activity in many regions.

Much discussion was directed toward this disassociation and lack of involvement by CBDNA members as active role models for high school teachers with the result that many high school band directors have turned to other models for guidance. Unfortunately, some of these models are based upon commercial, show business pageantry which is having a detrimental effect upon the instrumentation of many bands. The lack of double reeds and clarinets in high school bands, whose primary thrust is marching competition, is widespread throughout the country. You don't have to adjudicate too many bands in various parts of the U.S. before you come across a 75-piece group with 35 brass, 15 percussion, 10 flutes, 6 clarinets, 9 saxophones and 25 flags who are still out in the bus!

This emphasis upon activities that utilize arrangements and publications which diminish the importance of the woodwind section is detrimental to the future of the college/university band. It really assumes proportions of artistic disaster when marching band arrangements constitute the majority of a high school Spring concert repertoire (in

preparation for the Summer competition season and the Fall football season).

We in CBDNA have only ourselves to blame for these excesses for we have not been active enough, vocal enough and commanding enough on the State Music level concerning directions that have little or no place in education processes. Let's keep entertainment as good and as invigorating as possible and let it function on its highest plane, but let us not allow it to replace those musical programs of an artistic level that so many have worked so hard to develop over the better part of this century.

An interesting development has taken place in Oregon during the past few years. The number of clarinet performers in secondary schools had diminished to a dangerously low level due to lack of development and use of the instrument; this was turned around by the start of the State Clarinet Day in which as many performers and teachers gathered together to play, hear and talk all things clarinet! Through this rebirth the interest in maintaining balances in the woodwinds has grown, and the state is now reported to be "clarinet-safe"!

I welcome your input on these matters and the other subjects discussed in this issue of the **Report**. Better yet, sit down and write an article on something that is of utmost importance to you and send it off to Gary Corcoran for the next issue. We'll print it unedited in the *Sounding Board* column! See you in Rehearsal.
