Grechesky Reports on IGEB

The Eighth International Congress of the International Society for the Promotion and Investigation of Wind Music was held this past summer from July 12-17, in Pinkafeld/Oberschutzen, Austria. The conference, hosted by IGEB founder, Dr. Wolfgang Suppan, was a fantastic experience for all those involved, including the largest contingent of Americans ever to attend a conference of IGEB.

The increased attendance was no doubt prompted by the presentation of Herr Suppan, Herr Brixel, and Herr Habla at the last National Convention of CBDNA at Northwestern University in 1987. The interesting session presented by these gentlemen, coupled with the ease of joining the Society, spurred many Americans, this writer included, to join this fascinating and diverse organization.

The Oberschutzen Conference was truly an international gathering, with members from West Germany, Switzerland, Netherlands, USA, Italy, Hungary, Yugoslavia, Finland, Luxembourg, Great Britain, Surinam, South Africa, Egypt, Spain, and Austria in attendance. The opportunity to share musical, scholarly, and cultural values in an atmosphere of friendship, camaraderie, and cooperation was one of the most exhilarating and broadening experiences one could ever hope to have.

The conference included concerts by various youth bands from Austria, Hungary, and Germany; sessions where papers on various topics relating to wind music were presented; and a number of social gatherings that were memorable indeed. Two such gatherings were an evening of food and drink in an Austrian vineyard (held on the first evening of the conference, it was a great way to "break the ice"), and a state reception and dinner hosted in the Esterhazy Palace in Eisenstadt by the Prime Minister of the Province of Burganland. There were also several informal evening sessions at various "weinstube" establishments that were not only very informative, but also helped to break down cultural barriers.

Americans who presented papers at the Conference included Roger Beck, St. Paul, MN, and Richard Hansen, St. Cloud State University; Raoul Camus, City University of New York; Robert Gifford, Southeast Missouri State University; Robert Grechesky, Butler University; Stephen Miller, Springfield, MO; Jon Mitchell, Carnegie-Mellon University; Jon Piersol, Florida State University; and Clyde Shive, Drexel University. Other Americans in attendance were Leon Bly, Director of Bands at the University of Stuttgart, West Germany, and Eleazar Gomez of St. Paul, MN.

On behalf of all the American attendees, I would like to thank Dr. Suppan for his warmth, graciousness, and hospitality in making the conference the notable success it was.

The next conference will be held in 1991 and in conjunction with the 200th anniversary of Mozart's death, will focus on the wind music of that great composer. The conference will be held in Urtenburg, Hungary, which is the site of the summer palace of the Esterhazys.

The archive contains the on-going fruits of years of collecting band music and information about band music. The collection was the source of Suppan's monumental book, the "Lexicon of Blasmusik". It contains thousands of items, including scores, parts, program books, journals, catalogues, biographies, and information on virtually every kind of band music. I was fortunate enough to be able to spend the better part of a week there, and barely scratched the surface of what is available. This is an incredible source of information for band conductors, and Dr. Suppan is a most gracious host. The village of Purgg, located in the Austrian Alps, is one of the most beautiful areas imaginable, and would be well worth visiting even without the Band Archive. Foster Honored by KBA

Robert E. Foster, Director of Bands at the University of Kansas, was honored by the Kansas Bandmasters Association and Phi Beta Mu at the annual KBA Convention in Wichita when he was selected as the "Outstanding Band Director" — an award which has been presented to one selected band director each year since 1975.

Since 1971 Mr. Foster has directed the KU Band program, overseeing its growth from a marching band of some 120 students and two concert bands to the major band program that it is today, with a major university marching band involving some 250 members, three concert bands, the wind ensemble, two basketball bands, three jazz ensembles, and numerous smaller ensembles and pep bands.

A widely known composer and author as well as a successful conductor and clinician, Foster has also been on the board of directors of the American Bandmasters Association, the National Band Association, the Kansas Bandmasters Association, and the John Philip Sousa Foundation. He is on the International Jury of the Sudler International Wind Band Composition, and he is President of the Southwest Division of the College Band Directors National Association.

New Study of Erik Leidzen

(1894-1962)

For thirty years Erik Leidzen (1894-1962) served as the chief arranger/composer for the Goldman Band of New York City. His arrangements and compositions have been played extensively across America in both college and high school ensembles. He is fondly remembered as a gifted contributor to the development of the American wind band movement and its repertoire.

A new life/works study of Leidzen has been commissioned by The Edwin Mellen Press, in cooperation with The Salvation Army (for whom Leidzen volunteered so much time and music). Ronald Holz, Chairman of the Division of Fine Arts at Asbury College, and a CBDNA member, will be the author. His previous band research includes the centennial history of The New York Staff Band, Heralds of Victory, released in 1987.

Holz will be surveying the CBDNA membership by random sample to gain current opinion on Leidzen and his music. Vito Pascucci Named to Hall of Fame by Music Merchants

The National Association of Music Merchants awarded its highest honor to Vito Pascucci, President of Kenosha-based G. Leblanc Corporation, when he was inducted into the NAMM Hall of Fame during ceremonies held at the Georgia World Congress Center on June 25.

The NAMM Hall of Fame was instituted a year ago as a means of recognizing excellence and leadership in the music industry. Only three living persons have thus far been honored with the award, and Pascucci is the sole representative of wind-instrument makers.

The awards program, held in conjunction with the three-day NAMM International Music & Sound Expo in Atlanta, was attended by approximately 2000 people and hosted by MTV veejay Julie Brown. Presentation of the award was made by NAMM President Donald Griffin, who called Pascucci "an entrepreneur and a self-made man whose name is legendary within the music industry and among musicians." Accepting the award, Pascucci praised his partner, Leon Leblanc; his son, Leon Pascucci; and the entire NAMM organization.

The evening's festivities concluded with a concert by the eight-piece band, "Chicago," whose dynamic brassand-rock sound has sold nearly 100 million albums since the band was founded 20 years ago.
