The 26th National Conference of CBDNA, the "Golden Anniversary" Conference celebrating the association's 50th year, was held at the Holiday Inn Crowne Plaza and on the campus of the University of Missouri-Kansas City, February 20-23. A record number of members attended this special conference, which was hosted by Gary Hill, Director of Bands at UMKC. Gary did a magnificent job in handling the myriad details associated with an undertaking of this magnitude.

President Richard E. Strange and the CBDNA Board dedicated this convention to the association's Past Presidents and to its Founder and Honorary Life President, Dr. William D. Revelli. ILLINOIS

[Editor's note--The information below is taken from a new state newsletter published at Millikin University by Gary Shaw and James Moyer and helps to catch up on news from Illinois since Fall, 1989.]

The Association of College and University Band Directors in Illinois met during the February convention of the Illinois Music Educators Association. The first new music commission by this association has now been completed. The work, *Sun Song* by Minnesota composer **Libby Larsen** is a three-movement piece based on the poems of Langston Hughes.

This past fall, John Paynter, Director of Bands at Northwestern University had the opportunity to conduct two programs in Europe. Mr. Paynter was Guest of Honor at the BASBWE Conference in Glasgow, where he conducted several bands and presented talks and clinics. While in Glasgow, Paynter presented a program with wind and percussion performers of the Scottish National Symphony Orchestra. In Budapest, he prepared a concert with performers from the National Hungarian Radio and Television Orchestra. The program included Igor Stravinsky's Symphonies of Wind Instruments and Concerto for Piano and Wind Instruments and was broadcast for a European-wide radio audience.

The Northwestern University Symphonic Wind Ensemble has accepted an invitation to perform in Manchester, England for the 10th Anniversary Conference of WASBE in July. In addition, the group will perform at the Cheltingham Festival, Cambridge Festival and the BBC Proms Concert in Royal Albert Hall, London.

Last March, the Illinois Wesleyan University Wind Ensemble, conducted by Steven Eggleston, presented a concert which featured

renowned trumpeter, **Anthony Plog**. Mr. Plog performed the *Concerto in E-flat* by Hummel and *La Virgin de la Macarena*, arranged by Mendez. He also presented a master class for IWU brass students.

In April, the Illinois Wesleyan School of Music hosted Pulitzer Prize winning composer **Karel Husa** for a weekend of rehearsals and talk culminating in a performance of Husa's *Music for Prague 1968*. Steven Eggleston notes that "the performance was rather timely, considering that Mr. Husa had just returned home from Prague, where he conducted this piece for the first time in celebration of the recent release of Czechoslovakia from communism."

The Concordia University Wind Symphony, conducted by Richard R. Fischer, has presented the first U.S. performances of two works by Johan de Meij, The Lord of the Rings and Loch Ness. Last May, the composer presented a master class at Concordia University. Other recent music commissions by the Concordia Wind Symphony include Chants and Meditations (1986) by Mark Elling Bensen, Festive Adorations (1986) by Vaclav Nelhybel (premiered at the CBDNA National Convention, Northwestern University), and Past the Equinox (1987) by Jack Stamp.

Allan McMurray, Director of Bands at the University of Colorado, was guest conductor of the Concordia Wind Symphony in December, 1989.

Richard R. Fischer was selected by Allan Mc-Murray to study conducting in the Conducting Intern Program last August in Arrowbear, California.

The Millikin University Wind Ensemble, conducted by Gary Shaw, toured Europe for ten days in March, 1989, presenting concerts in Alkmaar, the Netherlands; Dinkelsbühl and Cologne, West Germany; and Salzburg, Austria. The tour program featured music of American composers, including Copland, Chance, Washburn, King, Sousa, and Millikin University composer Donald Chamberlain.

The 1990 fall tour of the Millikin Wind Ensemble included performances at New Trier and Tinley Park High Schools. The group also rehearsed at Northwestern University with John Paynter in preparation for a December concert on the Millikin campus which featured Mr. Paynter as guest conductor of both the Wind Ensemble and University Concert Band.

Minutes for 1990 CBDNA Board of Directors

Hilton Hotel - Chicago, IL Friday, December 21, 1990 8:30 a.m.

President-Elect Ray Cramer called the meeting to order at 8:30 a.m. in the Hilton Hotel in Chicago. Members present were: Richard Strange, Craig Kirchhoff, John Wakefield, Larry Gookin, James Croft, Miles Johnson, Gary Hill, John Thrasher, and Richard Floyd.

Budget/Minutes

Copies of the minutes from the 1989 Board Meeting in Chicago were reviewed. *Motion:* To approve the minutes. (Gary Hill; seconded by John Wakefield). Motion passed.

Richard Floyd presented a financial report for the past fiscal year. In the light of the association's current financial position, the report included the following recommendations:

- 1. That a more structured budgetary procedure be followed in the future.
- 2. That new projects be developed to utilize available funds to serve the needs and priorities of the membership.
- 3. That the Board consider a constitutional revision to increase the division rebate from its current base of \$750.

Motion: To approve the financial report. (Richard Strange; seconded by James Croft). Motion passed.

Division Reports

Western Division-John Thrasher. The Western Division had a highly successful meeting in conjunction with the Northwestern Division. The next conference is scheduled for March 19-21, 1992 in Reno, Nevada.

Northwestern Division--Larry Gookin reaffirmed the success of the joint meeting with the Western Division and advised the Board that the two divisions would again meet jointly in 1992. There is preliminary discussion regarding a joint commissioning project between the Northwestern and Western Divisions. The premiere would take place at the 1992 conference.

Southwestern Division--Gary Hill expressed thanks to Gene Thrailkill and Bill Wakefield for their outstanding work as conference hosts for the 1990 meeting at the University of Oklahoma. The next assembly of the Southwestern Division will be hosted by the University of Arkansas-Fayetteville on January 30-February 1, 1992.

North Central Division--Miles Johnson reported that the North Central Division Conference, which featured special recognition of Frederick Fennell, was an over-whelming success. He further stated, however, that joint conferences with NBA had not proven to be successful. The 1992 Conference will be held in late February at Michigan State University.

Richard Suddendorf had resigned as North Central President Elect. Tom Dvorak will move up to fill the vacancy and join the National Board in 1991. The Vice President's position will be filled according to CBDNA Constitution and By-Laws provision at a future meeting.

Concerns were also expressed regarding the responsibilities of state chair persons. Robert Spradling has developed an extensive state chair manual that is currently being circulated to all state chairs.

In his concluding comments, Miles announced that the North Central Division has planned to organize an intercollegiate honor band. Its first conductor will be John Paynter.

Southern Division-James Croft announced that the high points of the Southern Conference were the clinic presentations prepared by Larry Rachleff. Attendance at the conference was small because of some unavoidable conflicts with state meetings; however, enthusiasm and collegiality are at an all-time high in the Southern Division. There is concern regarding the diminishing involvement of black directors in CBDNA activities.

The 1992 Southern Conference will take place in Charlotte, South Carolina, January 23-25, with Bill Gora as host. Feature clinician will be Stan DeRusha and the key note performance will be given by the United States Air Force Band.

Eastern Division-John Wakefield affirmed that the Eastern Division is alive and well. He commented that the joint meeting with the New York High School Band Directors Association enhanced both groups' participation, and he commented in detail on the status of the New England Band Directors Association and its relationship to CBDNA. He is particularly concerned that, in general, New York and Pennsylvania are not actively involved in CBDNA activities.

The 1992 conference will be held at the University of Maryland, and the dates will be set shortly.

Tom Duffy will join the Board representing the Eastern Division after the National Conference in Kansas City, and Robert Spradling will move up to the position of President-Elect.

John Wakefield was particularly pleased to announce that a structured "election track" was now firmly in place for the Eastern Division.

Constitution/By-Laws Revision

Richard Strange suggested that a revision be made to designate the Past President as chair of the Board. Discussion centered on the fact that the assignment of the Past President to this position would add continuity for the future. Further discussion produced a consensus that the current system was working and that it was helpful for the President-Elect to serve in this position prior to

assuming the leadership of the organization. It was agreed that no change in the current procedure was needed.

Further discussion focused on the allocation of funds to the divisions. It was recommended that allocations be raised to a higher specified amount. Larry Gookin suggested that we revise the by-laws to permit the Board to determine the amount on a year-to-year basis rather than having a specific dollar figure included in the Constitution. It was ultimately agreed that Richard Floyd, Secretary-Treasurer, would prepare a proposal for consideration by the Board at its meeting in Kansas City.

CBDNA Directory

Tom Fraschillo reported that ad sales for the 1991 CBDNA Directory were currently in progress. He expressed concern that fewer companies may advertise because of budget restraints. The Board discussed the layout and format of the Directory and agreed that no changes should be made. The CBDNA Constitution and By-Laws will continue to be published in the Fall issue of the Report. Written report attached.

Commissioning Panel

In the absence of Don Hunsberger, Chairman of the Commissioning Panel, Allen McMurray was present to elaborate on Don Hunsberger's written report. A specific proposal under discussion would allow for matching grants up to \$5,000 for consortiums that wished to commission new works for band. Ray Cramer spoke in favor of the recommendation, and Jim Croft suggested that we approach foundations to seek matching grants.

Motion: To allocate \$10,000 for the Commissioning Committee to use as matching grants with consortiums comprised of CBDNA members and their universities. (Richard Strange; seconded by Craig Kirchhoff). Motion passed.

It was agreed that the Commissioning Committee meet again during the National Conference in Kansas City to finalize the matching grant program and to discuss future projects of the Commissioning Committee.

University of Colorado Conducting Symposium

Allan McMurray requested continued support of the CBDNA Conducting Symposium at the University of Colorado. He reported that 78 CBDNA members have participated in the past and that the project has generated new membership for CBDNA. He requested a sum of \$3,000 to supplement clinician fees and to provide a specific session on how to organize a consortium commission.

Motion: To provide \$3,000 for the University of Colorado conducting workshop (James Croft; seconded by Craig Kirchhoff). Motion passed.

International Repertoire Project

Bob Grechesky requested funding for a joint American and European repertoire project. Written report attached.

The Board asked Bob to prepare a more specific financial proposal and time line to be considered at the National Conference in Kansas City.

CBDNA Journal

Tom Duffy submitted a written report concerning the status of the *Journal* and emphasized the fact that recent revisions in production procedures had dramatically reduced the cost of the *Journal*. He requested that CBDNA purchase necessary computer hardware to continue this process.

Motion: To accept Tom Duffy's request to purchase a computer under the provisions submitted by Tom Duffy. (Craig Kirchhoff; seconded by Gary Hill). Motion passed.

Gilmore Society

A proposal from the Gilmore Society was circulated. After a brief discussion, no action was taken.

TV Bowl Coverage

The continued concerns of the membership regarding the coverage of marching bands at the bowls was discussed. It was agreed that no action was necessary at this time.

1991 National Conference

Richard Strange submitted a detailed schedule of events for the 1991 National Conference in Kansas City. Gary Hill reported that 120 hotel rooms were already booked and that all plans for the conference were on schedule.

A detailed review of the financial commitments to the conference followed. It was agreed by the Board that all financial commitments were in order with the assurance that the Board's financial commitment (excluding registration fees) would not exceed \$5,000.

1993 National Conference

Ray Cramer stated that the 1993 Conference will take place February 24-27 in Columbus, Ohio. Some discussion followed regarding the housing. It was the consensus of the Board that the rate of \$75 per room at the Hyatt would not be prohibitive for the membership and that the amenities of this propriety more than justified the slight cost increase.

1995 National Conference

Craig Kirchhoff stated that preliminary discussion had taken place with Allan McMurray and that there was a likelihood that the 1995 Conference would take place at the University of Colorado.

The meeting was adjourned.

ARTS STATEMENT ENDORSED BY CBDNA

The following motion which was made at the national convention in Kansas City by Thomas Duffy (Yale University) and seconded by Robert Spradling (Syracuse University) was passed by those in attendance.

Motion: That the provisions which follow be ratified by the present members of CBDNA. Regarding the statements provided by William R. Fitzsimmons, Dean of Admissions at Harvard University, and Worth David, Dean of Undergraduate Admissions at Yale University:

"The arts are clearly an integral part of life at Harvard and Radcliffe, important for their value to the college environment and also for the potential they provide for lifelong enrichment. In addition to academic criteria, therefore, we always consider extracurricular talents and personal strengths when we evaluate a candidate's credentials. We look for students whose previous participation in the arts shows that they can make a substantial contribution to our community."

"Qualifications for admission to Yale College include not only the reasonably well-defined areas of academic achievement and special skill in non-academic areas, but also the less tangible qualities of capacity for involvement, commitment, and personal growth.
