Guest speakers and panelists featured in the three-day meeting included William Moody (former Director of Bands and Director of the School of Music at the University of North Carolina), Roger Voisin (former principal trumpet with the Boston Symphony Orchestra), Gunther Schuller (composer/conductor/author), Thomas Duffy Director of Bands at Yale University), Thomas Brivelie (Head of Public Promotion, Theodore Presser Publishing Company, and Eero Richman (Director of Information at the American Music Center).

Boston area composer **Gunther Schuller** was honored by several area institutions in March during "Gunther Schuller Week," which was sponsored by the Share a Composer Consortium. This consortium, in existence since 1983, honors a living American composer through a week of public performances, lectures, radio interviews, student/composer meetings, and several informal events. This year's event concluded several celebrations of Mr. Schuller's 65th birthday.

The 1990-91 Consortium consisted of the Berklee College of Music, Brandeis University, Harvard University, Longy School of Music, Northeastern University, University of Massachusetts-Boston Campus, Tufts University, and WGBH (National Public Radio).

The Harvard University Summer Pops Band, conducted by Tom Everett is celebrating twenty years of music making. The band is open with no auditions or fees and has over 120 members, ages 12 to 80. The ensemble's programs are modeled after the diversity of the Boston Pops Orchestra and often features soloists from the Boston Pops. The Pops Band's August concert at the Hatch Memorial Shell will feature saxophone soloist Kenneth Radnofsky.

Frank Battisti, Conductor of the New England Conservatory Wind Ensemble, is having a busy summer with conducting clinics scheduled for Murray State University, Ithaca College, Cincinnati Conservatory, Fontbonne College (St. Louis), Western Washington University, and at the WASBE Conference in Manchester, England.

In March, Battisti conducted a concert with players from the New England Conservatory and the Moscow Conservatory in Rachmaninov Hall at the Moscow Conservatory. The concert was part of a two-month long "Making Music Together" Festival which featured joint performances by American and Soviet artists. The concert included music by Stravinsky, Riegger, Tower, Copland, and Korte.

NEBRASKA

The University of Nebraska-Omaha Symphonic Wind Ensemble, conducted by Dr. James R. Saker, presented the premiere of two new works during the 1991 season. Regions of the Arctic was premiered at the International Association of Concert Bands on April 5th. Eastman Heritage: A Paraphrase on a Theme by Howard Hanson by Andrew Boysen, Jr., was given its premiere on April 28.

The Wind Ensemble performed under quest conductor Lt. Col. Alan Bonner of the U.S. Air Force Band in February, and under Dr. Peter Martin of the University of Southern Maine in April. Allen Vizzutti was a featured soloist with

the group at the ACB Conference.

NEW HAMPSHIRE

Gary Corcoran has accepted a position as Director of Bands at Plymouth State College. Corcoran has been serving as Director of Bands at Georgia State University and is the Editor of the CBDNA Report.

The 1992 New England Intercollegiate Band Festival will be held April 10-12 at Dartmouth College and will be hosted by Max Culpepper.

NORTH CAROLINA

The East Carolina University Wind Ensemble, conducted by William W. Wiedrich, recently concluded a tour to the Washington, D.C. area where they performed four concerts and held clinics and master classes.

During the past season, repertoire featured composers who spent all or a large portion of their creative lives in the United States. Composers included in this series included Copland, Benson, Hindemith, Schoenberg, and Orff. Karel Husa's seventieth birthday was celebrated with a mostly-Husa program in April. This concert also included incidental music of Bedrich Smetana.

Igor Stravinsky was the featured composer in a concert by the East Shore Chamber Players, a unique ensemble formed recently by Conductor Wiedrich. In this group, university students have an opportunity to perform alongside their applied teachers.

The East Shore Honors Wind Ensemble, a select high school ensemble consisting of young musicians from North Carolina and Virginia gave its initial performance on May 12. This group is sponsored by the East Carolina University School of Music.

ADMISSIONS ARTS STATEMENT IS ACHIEVING RESULTS

CBDNA's admissions arts statement project, a product of the Kansas City convention, is beginning to gain momentum as a result of endorsements by some of the nation's leading universities. Statements by the deans of admissions at Harvard University and Yale University (reprinted on back cover) were sent to 100 colleges and universities, two in each state. The schools were asked to endorse, amend, or decline the Yale and Harvard statements.

To date, 39 schools have endorsed the statements or have added their own statement in favor of the fine arts experience as a positive factor in college admissions. Two schools declined to endorse, stating that, although they were in total agreement with the statements as well as the value of the secondary school fine arts experience to the quality of collegiate life, they did not factor that experience into their college admissions formula.
