I want to express my appreciation to each of you who has written to me indicating your interest and your commitment to the objectives of the Advisory Council and Task Force. I will be forwarding your letters to each of the respective chairpersons. I returned from the North Central Division Conference stimulated and recharged from all that I heard and all that I saw, and looking forward to rehearsing Shostakovich. Persichetti, and Hahn with renewed fervor. The following words are excerpted from a rather poignant letter that received the next Monday morning. I hope you don't mind that I am sharing it with you:

Dear Professor Kirchhoff:

Thank you for having the conductor's workshop on Saturday. I felt very fortunate to be given the opportunity to conduct both pieces with your bands. I wish that I had been more prepared to offset my nervousness.... In spite of that, I learned a lot.

When I returned from being away for the weekend, I was informed that one of my two baritones had dropped band for a work-study program. I've had two of my low brass players leave in the past two weeks. This is tough. Band has not been a priority here since the '70's. I'm the fourth band director in four years. I've been here for a year-and-a-half. It's really difficult to remain focused on the positive aspects of my teaching experience, as the negatives weigh heavily. It's such a fight! The community's expectations, the students' needs, the set standards for high school bands, the competition factor...Whew! I'm trying to provide a quality musical experience based on my own experience and training, balanced

with what I know the community wants (pep band, entertaining concerts, and good "scores" at contests)...and what the students need—a combination of musical challenges and fun, successful musical experiences.

Good luck with the Summer Symposium. I'd like to attend, especially if graduate credit would be available. I have credit towards my masters degree in oboe performance from the University of Oregon...but mostly miscellaneous graduate credits from various workshops over the years, since I've been teaching and raising a family (I'm still doing that). Jonathan is age 12 and Joshua is 16. They are good kids, but they get tired of their mom being gone all of the time for this orchestra gig and that quintet rehearsal. After the state convention I'm going to cut back for awhile. I have a five-year marriage that is in crisis, so I need time to care for my soul and for my family. Life is full of challenges, isn't it? But, I've been lucky.

All the task forces in the world may not save music education in our schools, but reaching out and touching our colleagues at the high school, middle school, or elementary school levels, and acknowledging the sometimes insurmountable obstacles they face on a daily basis may accomplish more than one might ever imagine.

# Frederick Fennell International Young Conductors Competition

Dear CBDNA Colleagues-Age 35 and Under:

December of '94 may seem a time a way (for some of us, something like being 35 years old), but it will be here soon!

I am sure that there are many among you who should enter. Let us see your video. Secretary to the Jury, Dr. Richard Floyd, will send the information to you with his customary dispatch. I shall look forward personally to the potential result.

#### I. PURPOSE

 To recognize the highest standards of wind ensemble conducting and musicianship at the international level of excellence through the medium of the wind ensemble.

2. To encourage the young conductor by encouraging excellence in all aspects of the conducting experience.

 To continue the growing acceptance of the wind and percussion medium by composers, audiences, artistic institutions, and musicians in all fields of the discipline.

4. To promote an awareness of the brotherhood of man among the peoples of the world through music.

#### II. SPONSOR

1. The competition is sponsored by Frederick Fennell, Inc.

## III. ORGANIZATION

 The Frederick Fennell International Young Conductors Competition will be organized and administered by an International Administrative Board composed of the members of the Executive Committee of the John Philip Sousa Foundation plus at least one member nominated by Dr. Fennell.

#### IV. THE PRIZE

 A prize of two thousand dollars (\$2,000 U.S.) will be awarded to the winning conductor selected by the International Jury.

2. In addition, the winner will receive the Sousa Foundation Diploma of Honor.

#### V. ELIGIBILITY

 The competition is open to any conductor between the ages of 21 and 35 years regardless of sex, religious belief, color, or ethnic origin.

The contestant will not have reached his 35th birthday during the year of the competition.

#### **VI. APPLICATIONS**

 All entries must be submitted on the official application form provided by the International Administrative Board of the competition. Note: This form may be duplicated. There is no entry fee.

- All entries must be accompanied by a video tape in VHS (no Beta) format.
- No scores need be provided.
- A current, brief biography showing conducting credits, education, and experience must accompany the application.
- 5. A glossy photograph suitable for printing reproduction (black & white or color) must accompany the entry.
- Materials submitted, except the video tape, may not be returned.
- Only the name of the winning conductor will be released. The names of all other entries will remain confidential.

#### VII. ACCEPTANCE

1. The receipt of all applications will be acknowledged by the Secretary to the Jury.

#### VIII. SCHEDULE

- The International Conducting Award will be made biannually in even numbered years.
- Entries for the 1994 competition must be received by the Secretary to the Jury no later than July 1, 1994.
- The jury will screen the video tapes and select the winner in December of 1994.
- 4. The presentation ceremonies for the International winner will be arranged by the International Administrative Board in conference with the Chairman of the Jury and the winning conductor.
- The award ceremony, with the winning conductor conducting, will take place at a convenient location and at a propitious time so that performance by a wind ensemble or symphony band of international reputation and excellence may be utilized.

# IX. THE INTERNATIONAL JURY

- Dr. Frederick Fennell will serve as chairman of the International Jury
- Richard Floyd, The University of Texas at Austin, will serve as Secretary to the Jury. The Secretary will not vote.
- The International Jury will consist of wind ensemble and symphony band and orchestra conductors of national and international repute. The jury will be appointed by and will serve at the pleasure of the International Administrative Board.
- 4. The International Jury will be composed of not less than, but not limited to, five members.

#### X. RULES

- The video tape must show the contestant conducting a wind ensemble or symphony band in both a performance and rehearsal setting as follows:
  - a. A complete performance of Schoenberg's *Theme* and *Variations*, Op. 43a.
  - b. A 15 to 20 minute rehearsal video tape of the Strauss Serenade in Eb, Op. 7, for 13 winds.
- 2. Availability of music.
  - a. The Schoenberg Theme and Variations, Op. 43a is distributed by Belmont Music Publishers, P. O. Box 231, Pacific Palisades, CA 90272, USA,
  - b. Any current edition of the Strauss *Serenade in Eb*, Op. 7 for 13 winds may be utilized for the rehearsal portion of the video tape.
- Permission will be granted to the John Philip Sousa Foundation to make a copy of the winner's tape which will be used only for archival purposes.
- 4. The English version of the rules will apply. Prizes will be paid in U. S. dollars.
