The "business office" of CBDNA continues to work smoothly thanks to Richard Floyd's monumental work as executive secretary and Pat Hoy's as treasurer. And since we have now moved all publication operations to Austin, Dick has simplified the process of getting the Report and the Journal to you.

Among the most important aspects of our organization are the annual conventions that bring us together as musicians, friends, scholars, and students. **Jerry Junkin** and I have worked closely together in planning the National Convention in Austin. Preparation is well underway for the first-ever national Small College Intercollegiate Band which will convene at the CBDNA conference in Austin this February. General information was mailed to the full CBDNA membership in late September to ensure that all interested parties were made aware of this opportunity, with application and selection processes completed in the following month.

Highlights of the Small College Intercollegiate Band will include **H. Robert Reynolds**, University of Michigan, as principal conductor; premiere performance of the overture to the CBDNA-commissioned opera, *Bandanna*, by Daron Hagen; and small college conductors presenting "gems" for the small college band.

This endeavor builds on a similar project which was well-received at last year's North Central/Southwestern division conference in Kansas City. Accordingly, we anticipate that a strong group of students and directors from across the country will be with us in Austin.

John Culvahouse of The University of Georgia reports:

The University of Georgia Bands will host the 8th Annual Middle School Band Festival on December 10-12, 1998. Honor Band clinician will be Quincy C. Hilliard, noted composer and conductor. The Festival has commissioned a Grade III work by Dr. Hilliard which will be premiered by the Honor Band at the Festival conducted by the composer. Commissioned works are set for premiere by Ed Huckeby in December 1999, and Jay Dawson in December 2000. The 8th Annual Festival includes five additional clinic bands, workshops and instrumental clinics for students and directors and featured performances by outstanding guest middle school ensembles. Other guest clinicians and conductors include Edna Grace, Lou Cefus, Frank Folds, Marcia Laird, and Shelly Boardman.

The 49th Annual January High School Music Festival will be hosted by The University of Georgia Bands January 21-24, 1999. The conductor of the Honor Band will be **Jerry Junkin**, with clinic bands conducted by **Tim Paul** and **Don Scholfield**. Rehearsals and performances

will be held in the Performing Arts Center at UGA. Outstanding high school bands will present guest performances for the Festival and include the Winder Barrow High School Symphonic Band (GA), the Harrison High School Symphonic Band (GA), and the Sumter (SC) High School Symphonic Band.

The University of Georgia Bands continue to commission new works for winds and percussion. In addition to the grade three work by Quincy Hilliard for the UGA Middle School Festival in December, Dr. H. Dwight Satterwhite and Dr. John N. Culvahouse are also excited about another commissioned work by Roger Cichy and David Gillingham's splendid new composition for The UGA Band program. The Gillingham work, for solo trumpeter with three trumpets, winds, percussion, and harp, will feature UGA Faculty Trumpet Artist Fred Mills.

John E. Williamson has written a book, entitled Rehearsing the Band, published by Neidig Services. The book contains a forward by Frederick Fennell and chapters by leading active band conductors, who "tell it like it is" in dealing with all aspects of band rehearsal. Participating conductors include: Frank Battisti, Eugene Corporon, James Croft, Donald Hunsberger, Jerry Junkin, Craig Kirchhoff, Allan McMurray, H. Robert Reynolds, James Smith, John Whitwell and John Williamson. The book also contains repertoire lists from each participant. Many of our colleagues are using the book as a text, as well as placing in their respective libraries. The Wisconsin Wind Orchestra, Lawrence Dale Harper, conductor, has recently released a new CD entitled *Romantic Sensibilities*. It contains the only known recording of *Marcia Funebre* by Giuseppe Filippa as well as the only CD recording of the Symphony in B-flat by Paul Fauchet. After twenty one years at the Royal Northern College of Music as Head of School of Wind & Percussion, **Timothy Reynish** conducted his farewell concert on June 17th. He assumes a new post as Consultant in Corporate Performance, working with the College Opera, Wind Orchestra and Chamber Orchestra, but will be free to pursue other conducting opportunities and to develop his work with BASBWE and WASBE.

The RNCM gave a number of premieres this year, including a very authentic Klezmer set of *Yiddish Dances* by Adam Gorb, whose brilliant Percussion Concerto had Evelyn Glennie as soloist. The Seventeenth Annual Conference of the British Association of Symphonic Bands and Wind Ensembles (BASBWE) was hosted by **Timothy Reynish** April 3-6, 1998 at the Royal Northern College of Music in Manchester, England. For the first time, the BASBWE conference was scheduled concurrently with the National Concert Band Festival sponsored by Boosey and Hawkes creating a large attendance for clinics, concerts and exhibits—a British Midwest.

Conductors from the United States who participated were Bobby Adams, Frank Battisti, John Boyd, James Croft, Jonathan Good and Jon Mitchell, Additional conductors and clinicians came from the United Kingdom, Switzerland, Germany, and Israel. Some of the conference highlights included the premiere performances with the RNCM Wind Orchestra of New World Dances by Martin Ellerby, Percussion Concerto by Adam Gorb, and The Kings Go Forth by Edward Gregson. The talented high school ensemble, the Chetham Wind Orchestra and Choir premiered Dance Rhapsody and Concerto Grosso, both by David Ellis.

Roger Lee Dancz (1930-1998)

It is with deep regret that we report the loss of University of Georgia Director of Bands Emeritus Roger Dancz. He has joined his wife Phyllis in death, leaving friends, alumni, and colleagues bereft.

After a trip to Michigan to visit family, Roger fell ill on August 28th and passed away on September 1st. Complying with his wishes, there was no funeral service. During pregame ceremonies at the Georgia/Kent State football game, a moment of silence was observed.

Roger was born in 1930 in Ludington, Michigan where he began playing trumpet in his high school band and in local dance bands. In 1948 he enrolled in Stetson University where he received the Bachelor of Music degree. He entered the Army in 1953 and performed with the Eighth Division and Third Army Bands. He later received a master's degree in Music from George Peabody Teacher's College.

His career at the University of Georgia began in 1955 when he was appointed to direct the band during the temporary absence of then-director J. Harris Mitchell. When Mitchell's leave was extended, Mr. Dancz was made full-time Director of the University Band, a position he maintained until his retirement in 1991.

Roger and his late wife Phyllis were deservedly credited with bringing an unprecedented level of performing excellence to the University of Georgia Bands. During his tenure, the size of the marching band rose from 25 in 1955 to over 350 at the time of his retirement. He was responsible for the creation of the University's Jazz Studies program, the Jazz Festival of Champions, the January High School Music Festival, and the High School Summer Music Workshop. In addition, Roger was nationally recognized as one of the first and most active supporters of original music for the wind band. Roger served CBDNA as Southern Division President for a term. After his retirement, he remained active in the Athens music scene, performing weekly with son Steve and other local musicians. He was also heard on his weekly show, "Invitation to Jazz," broadcast on the Peach State Public Radio Network.

Joe Christensen (1944-1998)

(excerpted from an article for the Iowa State alumni magazine, written by Karol Crosbie)

"It's easy for a trumpet to sound bad," Joe Christensen used to tell his students. "So don't ever let yourself do anything on your trumpet but make a beautiful sound."

And if lives are like trumpets—easy to sound bad, but glorious when played with care—surely the life of Joseph Christensen was one of the most beautiful. Christensen, Iowa State University Director of Bands, died September 17 of complications after surgery for a liver transplant. He came to ISU in 1974 as the Assistant Director of Bands and trumpet instructor and in 1980 was promoted to Director of Bands.

In addition to conducting the ISU Wind Ensemble and coordinating the activities of six additional ISU student ensembles, Christensen was a frequent guest conductor of high school honor bands and his guidance was highly valued by public school teachers across the country. Music educators—who have the delicate task of challenging students without intimidating them, of fine tuning technical strengths and at the same time nurturing and inspiring a love of music—say that Joe Christensen was one of the best.

The caring and music that were the center of Joe Christensen's life are being passed on to generations of students. "He was passionate, and selfless, and made us number one," said one former student. "And that taught us to make our students number one."

In honor and remembrance of Joe's service, the Iowa State Department of Music and ISU Foundation have established the Joseph Z. Christensen Band Scholarship fund. Memorials may be made through the ISU Foundation: Memorial Union, Iowa State University, Ames, IA 50011.

Stanley D. Hettinger

With the recent passing of Stan Hettinger, the wind band profession lost a close friend, devoted musician, conductor, colleague and teacher. I have known Stan for 30 years. He mentored me as a beginning teacher in Springfield, Vermont and later as a college band conductor. We enjoyed a close personal and professional relationship, sharing the podium, discussing personal experiences, organizing a symposium or conference and often talked literature and programming.

Stanley was proud of his profession and proud of his wind band colleagues. He was among the founding members of the New England College Band Directors Association, later serving as president and host of two Intercollegiate Band Festivals. He loved the CBDNA, attending meetings and conventions religiously. CBDNA and its membership were his inspiration and he held the office of president of the Eastern Division in the mid-eighties. Stan's election to the American Bandmaster's Association was the high point of his career. There is no meaningful honor in our profession than to be elected by your peers to this prestigious organization. The collective wisdom and achievement of this body of remarkable musicians is something of which Stan often remarked with great reverence.

May Stan rest in peace knowing that he deeply touched his colleagues as well as his students, family and friends.

West Virginia University premiered Dark Dreams of a Circus Bandstand by David Williams on April 16, 1998. The work was commissioned by the university's chapter of Kappa Kappa Psi in honor of **Don Wilcox**'s twenty-five years as Director of Bands.

The work is a set of variations on an original theme derived from the name of the honoree, Don Gene Wilcox. A five-note motif (D, G, E, E-flat, C) provides the pitch material for many of the piece's ideas. Further manipulation of the motif, with the addition of a B-natural, yields not only the first half of a twelve-tone row but the beginning of *Hail, West Virginia*.

The composer has attached this note to the score:

"A circus band conductor has unsettling dreams. From the outset of a performance, things go wrong: the usual C major chord is densely corrupted; the circus ringmaster strikes a sinister (perhaps even a Schoenbergian) tone; the opening march sounds almost like it has been taken apart and randomly reassembled. Worst of all, the music refuses to move fast enough."

David Maslanka's Sea Dreams, a concerto for two horns and wind orchestra received its premiere in April. Commissioned by a consortium of Horn professors, with additional support from the International Horn Society, it received simultaneous premieres by: Arizona State University, Ithaca College, University of Missouri-Kansas City, University of Oregon, Western Michigan University, University of North Texas, Interlochen Arts Academy, University of Alabama, Florida State University, and the University of Iowa.

The composer writes the following:

"I was born and raised in New Bedford, Massachusetts, the whaling port of Herman Melville's "Moby Dick." The sea has been a part of me forever. I was riveted by "Moby Dick" when I first read it at age fifteen. The mundane aspects of the book—the pictures of the varying ocean moods, the minute descriptions of the ship and of whaling gear—sprang to life for me as powerfully as the titanic struggles with the white whale. Since my youth, other stories of Melville, and among other things the paintings of Winslow Homer, and the

sea imagery in the poetry of Pablo Neruda have opened me in the same way.

"In my meditation life sea imagery has played a central role for years. The sea is the dream image of the unconscious; the seashore the connecting point of the conscious mind, I have grown up through the images of my inner sea.

"The Concerto is in three movements. The first is a double movement with a very serious and intense opening, and a released and joyous conclusion. The opening depicts the great ocean storm and the conclusion joy in deliverance.

"At the beginning of the second movement I have written in the score the words "moonlight on the quiet sea." It is a time to reflect upon and absorb the fierce emotions of the first movement. It is personal thought, and the opening of oneself to another. There is the understanding that in this life we are for the other.

"The third movement parallels the structure of the first. The opening, like its counterpart, is serious and intense—a message from the heart. Its conclusion is a rousing dance music. Throughout the Concerto there is a sense of transformation at work: the movement through terror, loss and death to an exhilarated joy in life."

BUSINESS - 1:

CBDNA

College Band Directors National Association Constitution and Bylaws

Article 1: Name

The organization shall be known as the College Band Directors National Association.

Article 2: Purpose

The purpose of the organization is to assist members in seeking individual and collective growth as musicians, educators, conductors, and administrators.

Article 3: Membership in the Association

A. Active.

- 1. College/university band directors including Associate and Assistant directors-active or retired.
- 2. Former college/university band directors now engaged in college/university music education, administration or related areas.
 - 3. Honorary Life Members.

B. Associate.

- 1. Professional Associate i.e., director of a military service band, community band, secondary school band.
- 2. Music Industry one member of the firm shall be designated as representative to the Association.
- 3. Student graduate or undergraduate who is seriously involved in band activities and development.
- 4. Institutional any school or institution actively supporting band activities and development. One individual may represent the institution as an active member if qualified under Article III, Active, no. 1.

C. Rights and Privileges.

- 1. Only active members shall be entitled to vote on Association business and to hold elected office. Active membership is maintained through payment of annual dues.
- 2. Active members upon retirement from their institution shall be entitled to a reduced dues assessment.
- 3. Honorary Life Membership may be conferred upon active members by the Board of Directors as a form of formal recognition of exemplary contributions to the welfare of college and university bands.
- 4. Associate members do not have voting rights and may not hold elected office in the Association; they may attend all CBDNA functions (with the exception of Business Sessions) and shall receive all CBDNA publications
- 5. Student membership is valid only during the period when the student is enrolled in graduate or undergraduate collegiate activities.

Article 4: Officers

The national officers shall consist of President, President-Elect, Vice-President, Secretary-Treasurer and Divisional Presidents. Together with the two most recent Past Presidents and the Honorary Life President, they shall constitute the Board of Directors.

Article 5: Conferences

The CBDNA shall meet in National Conference biennially beginning with the 1966-67 academic year, the time and place to be determined by the Board of Directors. The Divisional Conferences shall be held in alternate years, the time and place to be determined by the Divisional membership.

Concerts and instructive sessions presented at the National and Divisional Conferences shall be open to all members of CBDNA and their invited guests. Business sessions of the Association shall be open to active members only or by special invitation of the Board of Directors.

Article 6: Dues

The dues structure for various categories listed in Article 3 shall be: A. Active.

C. The National Secretary-Treasurer shall return a sum every biennium to each division based upon their respective membership enrollment at the beginning of the biennium (the two year period immediately following a National Conference). The sums to be returned, and the membership guidelines to followed are:

The Secretary-Treasurer shall collect all dues.

The Board of Directors may appropriate a sum up to \$10.00 per active member for the commissioning of new compositions for the wind band.

The fiscal year for CBDNA shall run from October 1 to September 30. The membership year shall be the same.

The terms of administrative office on both the National and Divisional level shall run from the close of one National Conference to the close of the succeeding Conference.

Article 7: Revisions of Amendments

Proposed amendments to CBDNA Constitution and Bylaws may be presented to the Board of Directors by either the Constitution Committee or by any officer of the Association at the time of the National Conference. The Board of Directors shall then determine by a majority vote which amendments shall be circulated to all members of active status within two weeks of the termination of the National Conference. Ballots shall be returned to the chairman of the election committee for tabulation within four weeks of the termination of the National Conference. An Amendment must

receive two-thirds of the votes cast to pass. An approved amendment becomes effective immediately, unless otherwise stated in the amendment.

BYLAWS

Article 1: Duties for National Officers

A. President. It shall be the duty of the President to organize the National Conference and to preside at all general meetings thereof. The President shall appoint a parliamentarian to each business session. It shall be the duty of the President to represent the CBDNA at other conferences or appoint a representative in his place when the Association is invited to send a delegate.

- B. President-Elect. It shall be the duty of the President-Elect to assume the duties of the President in his absence. It shall furthermore be the duty of the President-Elect to serve as chairman of Board of Directors meetings and to coordinate membership activities
- C. Vice-President. It shall be the duty of the Vice-President to assume the duties of the President in the absence of the President and the President-Elect. It shall furthermore be the duty of the Vice-President to administer and coordinate the activities of the National Committees.
- D. Secretary-Treasurer. It shall be the duty of the Secretary-Treasurer to perform the normal duties of a recording secretary and treasurer.

Article 2: Election of Officers

A. The President shall serve from the time of assuming office at the end of one National Conference to the end of the next.

- B. The President-Elect shall automatically accede to the office of President, and the Vice-President shall automatically accede to the office of President-Elect.
- C. Two candidates for the office of Vice-President shall be nominated and one shall be elected through the following procedure:
- 1. Only those who have served or are serving as Divisional Presidents and, those who have served as National Secretary-Treasurer for a period of six years or longer, shall be eligible for nomination. Past National Presidents are not eligible.
- 2. The Secretary-Treasurer shall have circulated to the active membership by mail a certified list of the names of those eligible, at least two months and not more than four months before the National Conference. This list will serve as a ballot on which each member may, and should, nominate two persons for the office. The ballot must be returned to the Secretary-Treasurer at least three weeks prior to the opening of the National Conference.
- 3. The nominating committee shall consist of at least five members. The National President and all past National Presidents in attendance at the National Conference shall serve on the nominating committee, with the most immediate Past President in attendance serving as chairman. In the event there are fewer than five qualified members for this committee, the current President

shall appoint enough members to make a full committee. The committee will receive from the Secretary-Treasurer the ballots and the tally, and using them as a guide shall nominate two persons with their consent, including (without designation) the one receiving the highest number of votes in the nomination balloting. The second nominee must be selected from among the five in this tally.

- 4. The election shall be by first class mail ballot circulated to the membership with a return envelope clearly marked CBDNA Ballot enclosed. The ballot shall be circulated to all members of active status within two weeks of the termination of the National Conference. Ballots shall be returned to the chairman of the election committee for tabulation within four weeks of the termination of the National Conference.
- D. Secretary-Treasurer. The Secretary-Treasurer shall be appointed by the Board of Directors.
- E. Divisional Officers. The Divisional officers shall consist of President, President-Elect, Vice-President and Secretary-Treasurer. The President-Elect shall automatically accede to the office of President, and the Vice-President shall automatically accede to the office of President-Elect. Divisional Vice-Presidents shall be nominated at the Divisional Conferences. The Divisional President will select a nominating committee who will submit two names for the office of Vice-President. The election shall be by secret ballot. This ballot shall be circulated to all active Divisional members within two weeks of the termination of the Divisional Conference. Ballots shall be returned to the Divisional Secretary-Treasurer for tabulation within four weeks of the termination of the Divisional Conference. The newly elected Divisional Vice-President shall assume office at the next National Conference.
 - 1. The Divisional President shall appoint a Secretary-Treasurer.
- 2. It shall be the duty of the Divisional President to organize and supervise the activities within his division. Divisional Presidents shall write letters of appointment to all officers of the Division, shall submit to the National President a list of Division officers, including state and committee chairmen.

Article 3: Standing Committees

Standing committees may be established, appointed and continued at the discretion of the President.

Article 4: Filling of Vacancies

In the event that a vacancy occurs in a National Office and the procedure for filling the vacancy is not specifically provided elsewhere in the CBDNA Constitution or By-laws then the President shall appoint a CBDNA member qualified under Article II of the By-Laws to fill the position subject to the approval of the Board of Directors. Such an interim appointment will be only for the remainder of the current term of office at which time the vacancy will be filled by election.
