From the Podium

Dear Colleagues,

As the fall winds down, my excitement grows daily in anticipation of the upcoming national conference, March 26-29, 2003 hosted by Craig Kirchhoff, Jerry Luckhardt, and Tim Diem at the University of Minnesota. Our hosts are taking great care to make sure that your experience is rewarding both personally and professionally. I am deeply grateful to these gentlemen for their hard work and I hope that you will take the time to express to them your appreciation for their efforts on our behalf.

The previously announced bands are preparing varied and interesting programs. On Wednesday we will have the opportunity to hear our "Chosen and Forgotten Gems" session featuring the University of Minnesota-Duluth Wind Ensemble conducted by Mark Whitlock (and a variety of CBDNA members), the Concordia College Band conducted by Russell Pesola, and the University of Minnesota Wind Ensemble conducted by Craig Kirchhoff. Thursday's concerts will include performances by the Columbus State University (GA) Schwob School of Music Wind Ensemble conducted by Robert Rumbelow, the University of Kentucky Wind Symphony conducted by Richard Clary, and the Arizona State University Chamber Winds and Wind Symphony conducted by Gary Hill. The University of Miami Wind Ensemble conducted by Gary Green, the Ohio State University Wind Symphony conducted by Russel Mikkelson, and the University of Southern California Thornton School of Music Wind Ensemble conducted by H. Robert Reynolds will perform on Friday. The final day of the conference will feature our Small College Intercollegiate Band, conducted by the Associate Conductor of the Minnesota Orchestra Giancarlo Guerrero, and the Indiana University Wind Ensemble conducted by Ray Cramer.

Conference sessions will include several new faces in addition to presentations by many of our own members. I am pleased to announce that Bastiaan Blomhert will present three different sessions while we are in Minneapolis. He will 1) discuss his research into the authenticity of Mozart's *Entfuhrung aus den Serail* Harmoniemusik and provide suggestions for staging the opera with a wind octet, 2) offer performance practice ideas and rehearsal techniques for chamber winds via the Strauss Suite in B-flat, and 3) present a lecture entitled, "A Classical Viola Player's Observations on Wind Music." If you are not familiar with Blomhert's work, visit his web site (www.bastiaanblomhert.nl) for a thorough introduction. I highly recommend his recording of Krommer Partitas and Marches with the Academy of St. Martin in the Fields Wind Ensemble on the Chandos label. Exploring our repertoire will be a major focus of the conference. Paula Holcomb will present a session on Messiaen's *Oiseaux Exotiques*, Alan Fletcher's *American Song* will be discussed by Mark Hopkins, Jerry Luckhardt will expand our knowledge of wind music from the pen of Eric Stokes, Robert Garofalo will share new research on the source materials for folk songs and dances in wind band classics, and Frank Battisti will host an open forum on repertoire as curriculum for the school band. Also, Terry Milligan will present an interesting view of the correlation and comparisons between music and architecture. "New perspectives (with strings attached)" will be the topic of a stimulating lecture by Frank Byrne, now Executive Director of the Kansas City Symphony.

Emphasis will also be placed on conducting pedagogy. A team of recent graduate students will present new research from the virtual conducting laboratory at Arizona State University. An extensive panel discussion, chaired by Glen Adsit, will present concerns and solutions for a wide variety conducting issues and pedagogical situations while Harlan Parker will explore ways to utilize the Laban Method fruitfully in the conducting classroom.

Jim Hansford, Director of Bands and Professor of Music at Oklahoma Baptist University served as a senior editor and writer for a recently published textbook, The Instrumental Resource for Church and School. The 400-page compendium is an indepth study of methods and materials that will prove invaluable for persons involved in church and school instrumental music. The five sections of the book include (1) A Philosophy of Instrumental Worship, (2) The Instrumental Conductor and Arranger; (3) The Instruments of the Orchestra; (4) The Instrumental Music Minister; (5) The Christian School Instrumental Music Educator and (6) What's Next: Wave of the Future in Contemporary Worship. Over 40 prominent Christian professional musicians contributed to the project. The other two senior editors include contributing editor Julie Barrier, writer, composer and adjunct music professor at Golden Gate Baptist Theological Seminary and coordinating editor, Mark Johnson, Editor/Ministry Specialist, Music Publishing and Recording at Lifeway Christian Resources in Nashville. PREMIERES

The Flute Concerto by Daniel Luzko received its world premiere April 29, 2002 by Irvine Valley College Wind Symphony, **Stephen Rochford**, conductor and Mary Palchak, solo flute at the Irvine Barclay Theatre. A 2nd performance on May 9, 2002 with the same ensemble and performers took place at California State University Fullerton.

The Concerto was composed for Mary Palchak in 2001-2002 at the invitation of the IVC Wind Symphony Commissioning Consortium. It is dedicated to Mary Palchak, The Irvine Valley College Wind Symphony and the California Concert Artists. The consortium members are:

California State University, Fresno (Lawrence Sutherland), Catholic University of America (Robert Garofalo), Eastern Washington University (Patrick Winters), Fullerton Community College (Tony Mazzaferro), Irvine Valley College (Stephen Rochford), Indiana Wind Symphony (Charles Conrad), Michigan State University (Wesley Broadnax), Mount San Antonio College (Jason Chevalier) and the CBDNA.

The composer provided the following:

"The idea to compose a new Flute Concerto came to me after my rewarding collaborations with both the Irvine Valley College Wind Symphony, Stephen Rochford, conductor; and Mary Palchak, professional musician and IVC applied flute instructor. In 2000 I composed my first work for winds and percussion titled *Arrival*. The piece received its premiere in May 2000. In November 2000 Mary performed the premiere of my Flute and Piano Duo, *David's Prayer, Psalm 17*.

Flute Concerto is projected to be a three movement work, somewhat related to the fast-slow-fast form of the classical period. The orchestration other than the solo flute part will be: 2 flutes, 2 clarinets, 2 oboes, 2 bassoons, 2 horns, 1 trumpet, 1 trombone, 1 tuba, harp, piano, string bass, and 3 percussionists. The duration of the piece will be approximately 20 minutes.

The primary influence upon my music is Latin American rhythms similar to those found in the music of Alberto Ginastera. My most influential musical training however was at the Chopin Academy in Warsaw, Poland. I was exposed to the ideas of the 20th Century "Polish School" of thought, mainly the controlled aleatoric techniques used by Witold Lutoslawski. Minimalism is another of my strong influences. I enjoy greatly the music of Louis Andriessen, John Adams, and Henryk Gorecki. I also have an affinity for the ideas and music of Olivier Messiaen. I consider my music somewhat eclectic, and consider Messiaen to be an interesting eclectic master of 20th century.

The first movement will be in an ABA structure. It will contain themes that although contrasting will be related to each other. The flute will take the lead in presenting the themes, which will sometimes also be doubled with other instruments to create coloristic or contrapuntal devices. Some of the contrasting ideas shall be exemplified through changes in dynamics, tempo, meter, harmonic and melodic materials. Each of the sections, (A and B), will have their own developmental sub-sections.

The second movement will be represented by harmonic/orchestrational colors and asymmetrical melodic lines. The harmonic content will consist mainly of parallel motions built upon triadic-polytonal chords. The melodic lines, presented principally by the solo flute, will be long and unpredictable. There will be a progressive building-up towards a climax which will "burst" forward towards the end of the movement.

In the final movement I will use two devices: the first will be an adding of the length of the melody, which I will call "Added Melody," (meaning that the melodic line will be repeated constantly, every time in a longer version), not to be confused with added value used by Messiaen, (adding of the value of any of the pitches of the melody). The second device will be an ostinato. The form of this movement will be quasi-rondo, in which the themes will have gradually thicker textures via progressive participation of the ensemble who will also be playing the "Added Melody." In the variations I will demonstrate the technical possibilities of the flute while the ensemble performs an ostinato accompaniment."

Ancient Chimes by Augusta Reed Thomas will be premiered in the new wind orchestration setting by **John Boyd** during the 36th Annual Indiana State University Contemporary Music Festival, October 30-November 1, 2002.

The composer writes: "In composing this symphonic work, my intention was to try to capture the emotional expression of the poem. *Ancient Chimes* is in two sections which are played without a pause. In the first section, *Distant Echo*, one hears ancient echoes of distant bells; the music is both desolate and rich. The music of the second section, *Winter Prayer*, is majestic and optimistic; one hears the bells as if standing below a large carillon in a winter landscape, the bells ringing with force and hope."

Ancient Chimes is a short overture that takes it's point of departure and inspiration from a poem by Anna Akhmatova. It was composed in 1993 for orchestra and is dedicated to Mstislav Rostopovich.

A new work for wind ensemble, *Homages* by Michael Djupstrom a 2002 composition fellow at the Boston Symphony Orchestra's Tanglewood Music Center, received its premiere performance on a concert performed by the Young Artists Wind Ensemble, **Frank L. Battisti**, conductor in Ozawa Hall, Tanglewood, MA on August 3, 2002.

Djupstrom, a 2002 graduate of the University of Michigan, states the following about his new piece:

"Due to the time constraints for writing the piece [2 months], I did not decide on any kind of program for the piece, nor, in the beginning, even a general plan for the work, rather, I just began to write. What came out may owe more to tradition than other recent projects. I did not set out to expand my technical vocabulary, explore any particular compositional devise or idea, but it is in no way less my work. Writing this piece helped me to realize that I am deeply connected to this compositional tradition, and deeply indebted to it. In the end, I was not surprised to discover that certain aspects of my piece resembled the work of other, long-dead composers. I believe that the scores of these great masters are still among the best teachers available to any composition student. These three movements do not aim to pay homage in the usual sense; they are not tributes to anyone in particular. In naming the work, I simply wanted to acknowledge my debt to my compositional predecessors, and in doing so, seek my place in the lineage."

Homages is an exciting, expressive, challenging three movement, twelve minute piece written for full wind ensemble instrumentation. Hopefully, the piece will be published and available in the near future. The weekend of May 3, 2002 the University of Missouri-Rolla celebrated the 75th anniversary of bands on their campus with four premieres of compositions written especially for this occasion. The commissioned composers and compositions were:

Andrew Boysen, Jr., currently conductor of the Wind Symphony at the University of New Hampshire and his brass and percussion fanfare *A Rather Noisy Fanfare*; Younghae Kim, a resident of Rolla and graduate of the New England Conservatory (MM- Theory and Composition) and her composition *Arirang*; Barry Morse, a freelance composer from Saco, Maine and former student of Walter Mays and his setting of *Shall We Gather at the River*?; and Timothy Mahr, Professor of Music and Conductor of the St. Olaf College Band and his composition *Rollick*.

The Atlanta Youth Wind Symphony, conducted by **Scott A. Stewart**, premiered *Tinker to Evers to Chance* by Carolyn Bremer on October 29, 2001 in Atlanta, Georgia. This accessible grade 3 piece recalls the legendary double-play combination for the Chicago Cubs from 1902-1910. As a baseball fan, Carolyn Bremer enjoys the beauty of a flawless double play; a gesture perfected through hard work and years of repetition. That elegant grace is the underlying motive of this piece, along with some clever appearances of *Take Me Out to the Ballgame*.

The world premiere of Adam Gorb's latest work, *Towards Nirvana* was given in Tokyo on Friday 18th October by the commissioning body, Tokyo Kosei Wind Orchestra, conducted by Douglas Bostock. The work is 18 minutes long, in three parts, mirroring the life and work Buddha, from the early days of laziness and indulgence, through the central section where he embraces austerity and tries to find his true self, through to the final section in which he achieves a middle way of perfect balance.

Gorb has scored the work for a large wind orchestra, including alto clarinet and contra bass clarinet, but with certain instruments cross-cued to make it practical. There are also oriental touches with the use of rain-stick and water-gong, and towards the end there is an aleatoric section in which the clarinets play recorders against a background of humming, the urban stress and violence of the first section dissolves into peace, but with certain ambiguities still offering up questions.

CBDNA Declaration of Principles

*W*e affirm our faith in and our devotion to the College Band, which, as a serious and distinctive medium of musical expression, may be of vital service and importance to its members, its institution, and its art.

To its members the College Band, through exemplary practices in organization, training, and presentation, should endeavor to provide effective experiences in musical education, in music culture, in musical recreation and in general citizenship.

*T*o its institution the College Band should offer adequate concerts and performances at appropriate functions and ceremonies, in the interest of music culture and entertainment, and for the enhancement of institutional spirit and character.

*T*o music as an art and a profession the College Band should bring increasing artistry, understanding, dignity, and respect, by thorough and independent efforts within the band's own immediate sphere, by leadership and sponsorship in the secondary school program, and by cooperation with all other agencies pursuing similar musical goals.

*T*o these ends we, the members of this Association pledge ourselves to seek individual and collective growth as musicians, as teachers, as conductors, and as administrators.

BUSINESS - 13

CBDNA College Band Directors National Association

Constitution and Bylaws

Article 1: Name

The organization shall be known as the College Band Directors National Association.

Article 2: Purpose

The purpose of the organization is to assist members in seeking individual and collective growth as musicians, educators, conductors, and administrators.

Article 3: Membership in the Association

A. Active.

1. College/university band directors including Associate and Assistant directors-active or retired.

2. Former college/university band directors now engaged in college/university music education, administration or related areas.

3. Honorary Life Members.

B. Associate.

1. Professional Associate - i.e., director of a military service band, community band, secondary school band.

2. Music Industry - one member of the firm shall be designated as representative to the Association.

3. Student - graduate or undergraduate who is seriously involved in band activities and development.

4. Institutional - any school or institution actively supporting band activities and development. One individual may represent the institution as an active member if qualified under Article III, Active, no. 1.

C. Rights and Privileges.

1. Only active members shall be entitled to vote on Association business and to hold elected office. Active membership is maintained through payment of annual dues.

2. Active members upon retirement from their institution shall be entitled to a reduced dues assessment.

3. Honorary Life Membership may be conferred upon active members by the Board of Directors as a form of formal recognition of exemplary contributions to the welfare of college and university bands.

4. Associate members do not have voting rights and may not hold elected office in the Association; they may attend all CBDNA functions (with the exception of Business Sessions) and shall receive all CBDNA publications

5. Student membership is valid only during the period when the student is enrolled in graduate or undergraduate collegiate activities.

Article 4: Officers

The national officers shall consist of President, President-Elect, Vice-President, Secretary-Treasurer and Divisional Presidents. To-

gether with the two most recent Past Presidents and the Honorary Life President, they shall constitute the Board of Directors.

Article 5: Conferences

The CBDNA shall meet in National Conference biennially beginning with the 1966-67 academic year, the time and place to be determined by the Board of Directors. The Divisional Conferences shall be held in alternate years, the time and place to be determined by the Divisional membership.

Concerts and instructive sessions presented at the National and Divisional Conferences shall be open to all members of CBDNA and their invited guests. Business sessions of the Association shall be open to active members only or by special invitation of the Board of Directors.

Article 6: Dues

The dues structure for various categories listed in Article 3 shall be:

A. Active.	
1. Active membership	\$60.00
2. Retired active membership	20.00
3. Honorary Life Membership	
4. Life Membership (Age 60)	300.00
B. Associate.	
1. Professional associate	50.00
2. Music Industry	100.00
3. Student	20.00

4. Institutional 75.00

C. The National Office shall return a minimum sum in the amount of \$2,500 to each division during the first year of the biennium (the two-year period immediately following a National Conference). The Secretary-Treasurer shall collect all dues.

The Board of Directors may appropriate a sum up to \$10.00 per active member for the commissioning of new compositions for the wind band.

The fiscal year for CBDNA shall run from October 1 to September 30. The membership year shall be the same.

The terms of administrative office on both the National and Divisional level shall run from the close of one National Conference to the close of the succeeding Conference.

Article 7: Revisions of Amendments

Proposed amendments to CBDNA Constitution and Bylaws may be presented to the Board of Directors by either the Constitution Committee or by any officer of the Association at the time of the National Conference. The Board of Directors shall then determine by a majority vote which amendments shall be circulated to all members of active status within two weeks of the termination of the National Conference. Ballots shall be returned to the chairman of the election committee for tabulation within four weeks of the termination of the National Conference. An Amendment must receive two-thirds of the votes cast to pass. An approved amendment becomes effective immediately, unless otherwise stated in the amendment.

14 - BUSINESS BYLAW

Article 1: Duties for National Officers

A. President. It shall be the duty of the President to organize the National Conference and to preside at all general meetings thereof. The President shall appoint a parliamentarian to each business session. It shall be the duty of the President to represent the CBDNA at other conferences or appoint a representative in his place when the Association is invited to send a delegate.

B. President-Elect. It shall be the duty of the President-Elect to assume the duties of the President in his absence. It shall furthermore be the duty of the President-Elect to serve as chairman of Board of Directors meetings and to coordinate membership activities

C. Vice-President. It shall be the duty of the Vice-President to assume the duties of the President in the absence of the President and the President-Elect. It shall furthermore be the duty of the Vice-President to administer and coordinate the activities of the National Committees.

D. Secretary-Treasurer. It shall be the duty of the Secretary-Treasurer to perform the normal duties of a recording secretary and treasurer.

Article 2: Election of Officers

A. The President shall serve from the time of assuming office at the end of one National Conference to the end of the next.

B. The President-Elect shall automatically accede to the office of President, and the Vice-President shall automatically accede to the office of President-Elect.

C. Two candidates for the office of Vice-President shall be nominated and one shall be elected through the following procedure:

1. Only those who have served or are serving as Divisional Presidents and, those who have served as National Secretary-Treasurer for a period of six years or longer, shall be eligible for nomination. Past National Presidents are not eligible.

2. The Secretary-Treasurer shall have circulated to the active membership by mail a certified list of the names of those eligible, at least two months and not more than four months before the National Conference. This list will serve as a ballot on which each member may, and should, nominate two persons for the office. The ballot must be returned to the Secretary-Treasurer at least three weeks prior to the opening of the National Conference.

3. The nominating committee shall consist of at least five members. The National President and all past National Presidents in attendance at the National Conference shall serve on the nominating committee, with the most immediate Past President in attendance serving as chairman. In the event there are fewer than five qualified members for this committee, the current President shall appoint enough members to make a full committee. The committee will receive from the Secretary-Treasurer the ballots and the tally, and using them as a guide shall nominate two persons with their consent, including (without designation) the one receiving the highest number of votes in the nomination balloting. The second nominee must be selected from among the five in this tally.

4. The election shall be by first class mail ballot circulated to the membership with a return envelope clearly marked CBDNA Ballot enclosed. The ballot shall be circulated to all members of active status within two weeks of the termination of the National Conference. Ballots shall be returned to the chairman of the election committee for tabulation within four weeks of the termination of the National Conference.

D. Secretary-Treasurer. The Secretary-Treasurer shall be appointed by the Board of Directors.

E. Divisional Officers. The Divisional officers shall consist of President, President-Elect, Vice-President and Secretary-Treasurer. The President-Elect shall automatically accede to the office of President, and the Vice-President shall automatically accede to the office of President-Elect. Divisional Vice-Presidents shall be nominated at the Divisional Conferences. The Divisional President will select a nominating committee who will submit two names for the office of Vice-President. The election shall be by secret ballot. This ballot shall be circulated to all active Divisional members within two weeks of the termination of the Divisional Conference. Ballots shall be returned to the Divisional Secretary-Treasurer for tabulation within four weeks of the termination of the Divisional Conference. The newly elected Divisional Vice-President shall assume office at the next National Conference.

1. The Divisional President shall appoint a Secretary-Treasurer.

2. It shall be the duty of the Divisional President to organize and supervise the activities within his division. Divisional Presidents shall write letters of appointment to all officers of the Division, shall submit to the National President a list of Division officers, including state and committee chairmen.

Article 3: Standing Committees

Standing committees may be established, appointed and continued at the discretion of the President.

Article 4: Filling of Vacancies

In the event that a vacancy occurs in a National Office and the procedure for filling the vacancy is not specifically provided elsewhere in the CBDNA Constitution or By-laws then the President shall appoint a CBDNA member qualified under Article II of the By-Laws to fill the position subject to the approval of the Board of Directors. Such an interim appointment will be only for the remainder of the current term of office at which time the vacancy will be filled by election.
