IN MEMORIAM

WARREN BENSON (1924-2005)

Warren Benson, composer, conductor, educator, performer, and author, passed away on 6 October 2005. Born in Detroit in 1924, he studied percussion and French horn at Cass Tech High School and completed Bachelor's and Master's degrees in Music Theory at the University of Michigan in 1951. He began performing professionally at the age of fourteen in theater orchestras and big bands, was the timpanist of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra in 1946, and was offered the Philadelphia Orchestra timpanist's position by Ormandy in 1948.

Don Sinta described Warren's teaching as "a different style of teaching characterized by an inquiry into the student's mind and an openness about providing challenge to that student." As a young educator Warren held positions at the Brevard Music Center; Anatolia College in Salonica, Greece (funded by two successive Fulbright Fellowships); and Mars Hill College in North Carolina. He then taught percussion, composition, and theory at Ithaca College (1953-1967) and composition at the Eastman School of Music (1967-1994). During the 1960s he designed and implemented two pilot programs for the Contemporary Music Project. His first book, Creative Projects in Musicianship, was an outgrowth of these projects. Other publications include his second book, . . . And My Daddy Will Play The Drums: Limericks for friends of drummers, completed in 1999, and his 1987 WASBE conference address on the "Aesthetic Criteria for Selecting an International Repertoire" that was published by CBDNA.

Among his numerous accomplishments, we owe a unique tribute to Warren for his contributions toward the development of an artistic, aesthetically stimulating repertoire for the modern wind ensemble. Warren once said, "I write music for people: family, friends, professionals, and amateurs alike. It is to give us pleasure that we collaborate; not without serious commitment, exposure, and risk; not without striving for genuine expression, new challenge, and fresh solutions worthy of the art." For these reasons, he composed nearly 150 works for wind ensembles, orchestras, choirs, soloists, and chamber ensembles and is best known for his wind ensemble music and song cycles, many of which have been recorded.

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Warren's significance has also been described by Frank Battisti, saying, "He has made a great contribution because he has been a compass. He constantly reminds us of what true north is, and his participation in organizations, his involvement, has always been one in which he questions. He re-focuses when certain things are overlooked. I think that he's basically made the profession more aware of their responsibilities to music, to art, and to creativity."

Warren received numerous awards and recognition through the years, including: 4 Fulbright Fellowships, 3 Consortium Composer Fellowships (NEA), John Simon Guggenheim Fellowship, 3 MacDowell Colony Fellowships, annual ASCAP Serious Music Awards, the Lillian Fairchild Prize, the Citation of Excellence from the National Band Association, Kilbourn Distinguished Professor, University of Rochester's University Mentor, election to the NBA Academy of Wind and Percussion Arts, election to the Percussive Arts Society Hall of Fame, and nominations for a Pulitzer Prize for Drums of Summer. These awards are insignificant, however, when compared to the numerous people whose lives have been changed by his innovative and visionary teaching and mentoring.

I would like to leave you with one final thought in Warren's words: "I wish I could hear more wind conductors and instrumental teachers using better and larger vocabularies that relate to beauty, aesthetics, to charm, to gentleness, strength and power without rancor or anger, to useful tonal vibrance, live sound, to grace of movement, to stillness, to fervor, to the depth of great age, the exultation of great happiness, the feel of millennia, the sweetness and purity of lullabies, the precision of fine watches, the reach into time-space of great love and respect, the care of phrasing, the delicacy of balance, the ease of warmth, the resonance of history, the susurrus of wind in the pines and whisperings in churches, the intimacy of the solo instrument, the kind weight of togetherness and the rising spirit of creating something, bringing something to life from cold print, living music, moving music."

He is survived by his wife, Patricia; a son and three daughters; and ten grandchildren. A Warren Benson Archive has been established at Eastman's Sibley Music Library and a "Warren and Pat Benson Forum on Creativity" has been endowed. Contributions to this endowment can be sent to:

ALFRED REED (1921-2005)

Alfred Reed passed away following a short illness on Saturday afternoon, 17 September 2005, at the age of 84. This world known band composer and long time WASBE member was born in New York City on 25 January 1921. As the son of Austrian immigrants, he grew up in a home where music was a part of daily life and became acquainted with the standard orchestral and opera repertoire while still a young boy. He began trumpet lessons at the age of ten years and was already playing in small hotel combos as a teenager. After studying theory and harmony privately with John Sacco, he worked as a staff composer and arranger for the Radio Workshop in New York. During World War II, he served as a trumpet player with the 529th Army Air Corps Band, for which he composed and arranged nearly 100 compositions. Following World War II, he studied composition with Vittorio Giannini at the Juilliard School of Music. In 1948, he became staff composer and arranger for the National Broadcasting Company and later served as staff composer and arranger for the American Broadcasting Company.

In 1953, he enrolled at Baylor University in Waco, Texas, where he served as conductor of the symphony orchestra. He received a Bachelor of Music degree in 1955 and a Master of Music degree a year later. His master's thesis, Rhapsody for Viola and Orchestra, was awarded the Luria Prize in 1959.

He served as executive editor for Hansen Publications from 1955 to 1966, when he joined the Theory & Composition and Music Education faculties at the University of Miami School of Music. During his tenure at the University, he succeeded Frederick Fennell as conductor of the Wind Ensemble, served a executive editor of the University of Miami Music Publications, and developed the first music merchandising degree program, which he administered until his retirement in 1993. Following his retirement, he composed extensively and maintained a busy guest conducting schedule, with performances in North America, Latin America, Europe, Asia, and Australia.

Among his many honors and awards was an honorary doctor of music degree from the International Concervatory of Music in Lima, Peru, election to the American Bandmasters Association in 1974, and the Academy of Wind and Percussion Arts Award in 1979. His published works include almost one hundred compositions for wind band, including five symphonies and such popular works as the *Russian Christmas Music*, the *Armenian Dances*, *A Festival Prelude*, and *El Camino Real*. At the time of his death, "He still had writing projects that he wanted to do," according to his wife Margie. David McCormick has written, "His gift to the world is a body of music that will continue to thrill, charm and delight audiences in virtually every country of the world, as it has done for the last fifty years."

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CLYDE ROLLER (1914-2005)

It is with sadness that Interlochen announces the passing of Dr. A. Clyde Roller on Sunday, Oct. 16. Dr. Roller had been associated with Interlochen for more than fifty years, serving as a conductor in the University and High School Divisions during the summer Arts Camp from 1951 through 2004. He served most recently as guest conductor of the High School Concert Orchestra in July 2004.

A. Clyde Roller was born October 13, 1914, in Rogersville, Missouri. He received his Bachelor of Music degree from Eastman School of Music in Rochester, New York. He served as resident conductor of the Houston Symphony; music director of the Lansing and Amarillo Symphonies; professor and conductor at the Eastman School of Music, University of Houston, University of Texas at Austin, University of Wisconsin at Madison, and Southern Methodist University; and principal guest conductor of the Oklahoma Symphony. Guest conducting engagements included appearances with orchestras in Portugal and throughout the United States, including the Boston Symphony Orchestra and the Alaskan Festival, and six tours with the New Zealand Symphony.

Dr. Roller was the recipient of Interlochen's Ovation and Applause Awards. In addition, he was the recipient of such national awards as the Outstanding Educator of America, American String Teachers Award for Outstanding Leadership, and American Bandmasters Association Edwin Franko Goldman Citation. Dr. Roller was one of three conductors honored at the 50th anniversary of the Eastman Wind Ensemble, and he was honored by the Moores School of Music at the University of Houston with the initiation of an annual award, the A. Clyde Roller Award, to be given to the outstanding player of the symphony.

Dr. Roller is survived by his wife, Moreland Kortkamp Roller; a daughter, Lynda Verner and husband, Tom, of San Antonio; a son, Jan Roller and wife, Lindsey, of San Antonio; two brothers, Dale Roller and wife, Betty, of Amarillo, and Roger Roller of Wichita, Kan.; and three grandchildren, Kristen and Brett Verner and Benjamin Roller, all of San Antonio. The family is planning a memorial tribute to be held next summer at Interlochen.

AUBURN UNIVERSITY

Vigils Keep Julie Giroux

Vigils Keep was commissioned by and is dedicated to the Auburn University Symphonic Band, Johnnie Vinson, conductor. It was premiered on April 15, 2005, during a concert for the participants of the Alabama All-State Band Festival. The theme of the concert was "A Celebration of Southern Music."

The composer writes: "Generations of southerners enduring life and poverty held together with a belief and hope that is perfectly captured in the lyrics of Sacred Harp #457, Wayfaring Stranger, verses one and two:

I am a poor wayfaring stranger, While journeying thru this world of woe, Yet there's no sickness, toil nor danger, In that bright land to which I go. I know dark clouds will gather o'er me, I Know my way is rough and steep, Yet beauteous fields lie just before me, Where God's redeemed their vigils keep.

Vigils Keep is not a theme and variation on Wayfaring Stranger, nor is it a collection of Sacred Harp songs. It is an original celebration of southern life and tradition, a tradition of generations steeped in hard physical work, tests of the human spirit and for many, black and white alike, poverty. The melody of Wayfaring Stranger weaves through Vigils Keep like faith has woven through southern history, holding everything together. All the rest of the notes are inspired by stories, family, the southern way of life and its music. It is my attempt at drawing a musical picture of what the south looks and sounds like both then and now. Vigils Keep will take you on a journey through the south where sometimes just to endure life, is an accomplishment."

COLUMBUS STATE UNIVERSITY

Dr. Robert W. Rumbelow and the Columbus State University wind program are pleased to announce the commissioning of composer Christopher Theofanidis along with 8 other consortia schools for an 8 minute work to be premiered by the CSU Wind Ensemble in January 2006. The consortium members are: Columbus State University (Robert Rumbelow), Eastman School of Music (Mark Scatterday), University of Miami (Gary Green), University of Michigan (Michael Haithcock), Western Kentucky University (John Carmichael), Florida State University (Richard Clary), University of North Carolina (Michael Votta), University of Tennessee (Gary Sousa), Georgia State University (Robert Ambrose).

CORNELL UNIVERSITY

Canzona III Norbert Palej

Originally from Miechow, Poland, Norbert Palej (b. 1977) is a DMA candidate at Cornell University studying with Steven Stucky and Roberto Sierra. He received his M.M. degree in composition at Julliard and his B.A. at the New England Conservatory. His awards include the ASCAP Young Composers Morton Gould Award (2004), the Toru Takemitsu Award from the Japan Society in Boston in 2002, the Benjamin Britten Memorial Fellowship for the Tanglewood Music Festival (2000), and many others. His work, 1940 – Their Finest Hour (2003) has been recorded by the Central Band of the Royal Air Force in London.

His *Canzona III* was commissioned by CU Winds. The premiere took place on Friday, October 14, 2005 with the Cornell Wind Ensemble, **Cynthia Johnston Turner** conducting. The work is one movement, about 10 minutes in length.

The composer writes the following: "The canzona flourished as an instrumental form in the late 16th century. Giovanni Gabrieli composed a number of terrific canzone, which exploited the antiphonal possibilities offered by the performance space they were written for, the Basilica di San Marco in Venice. Choirs of instruments could be positioned in different balconies of the cathedral to allow a three-dimensional acoustic experience. *Canzona III* uses similar antiphonal effects: choirs of instruments drawn from the wind ensemble interact in various ways. They respond to each other, echo each other, or they mix to form new colors.

Concerto for Four Saxophones, Winds, Brass and Percussion Eddie Mora Bermudez

Eddie Mora Bermudez (b. 1965) studied composition with William Porras at the Universidad Nacional de Costa Rica in 1980-81, where he later studied composition with Benjamín Gutiérrez in 1997 and Luis Diego Herra in 2003-04. He also studied violin with Maya Glizarova and Olga Voitova at the Tchaikovsky Conservatory in Moscow from 1983-92 and had private composition lessons with Yuri Vorontsov in Moscow in 2000 and 2003 and in San José in 2001.

His honors include the Costa Rican national music prize Aquileo Echeverría (1997, 1998, 2001, and 2003) and the Premio de la Asociación de Compositores y Autores Musicales in San José (2001). His music has been performed in Canada, Costa Rica, Mexico, The Netherlands, Russia, and the USA.

He has taught chamber music, composition, and violin as a professor at the Universidad de Costa Rica in San Pedro since 1992. The composer writes, "The concerto is in three contrasting movements. The first movement ("Marcha") is a largo march. The central theme appears twice in the saxophone soloists. The dry accompaniment of the percussion, the metals, and the low woodwinds mark the step,

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and provide the rhythmic impulse. The second movement ("Danza") is quick and rhythmic. The saxophones develop their individual "personalities" in constant dialogue with the ensemble. The third movement is a stylized tango ("Quasi a tango"). As in the previous movements, the soloists, more than against the ensemble, join with it, embedded in the musical development and in the orchestration. The work was commissioned by the CU Winds and its director Dr. Cynthia Johnston Turner, and it represents an excellent opportunity to share the wonderful world of the music between our universities and countries." The premiere will take place December 10, 2005 with the Cornell Wind Ensemble.

EMORY UNIVERSITY

Concertino for Euphonium and Wind Ensemble Kevin Kaska

The Emory University Wind Ensemble, conducted by **Scott Stewart**, has given a co-premiere of the Concertino for Euphonium and Wind Ensemble by Kevin Kaska. The work (grade V accompaniment, 14 minutes) was commissioned by Adam Frey and the Euphonium Foundation, with consortium funds from Georgia State University, the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, Concordia College, the University of Arizona, the Metropolitan Wind Symphony, South Effingham High School, the University of Oregon, Emory University, Middle Tennessee State University, and the Singapore West Winds. Adam Frey is on the music faculties of Emory University and Georgia State University in Atlanta.

On September 30, 2005, the Georgia State University Symphonic Wind Ensemble under the direction of **Robert J. Ambrose** gave the Southeastern United States premieres of Jonathan Newman's AVENUE X and Michael Colgrass' new work Bali. Colgrass was on campus in October for a two-day residency which included a finale concert featuring faculty and students from the School of Music.

GORDON COLLEGE

Yoolis Carol Hubert Bird

Hubert Bird has completed a commissioned work for the Gordon College Wind Ensemble entitled *Yoolis Carol*, a Medieval carol fantasy based upon 5 carols: Let All Mortal Flesh Keep Silence, Lullay, lullay: Als I Lay on Yoolis Night, Puer Nobis Nascitur (Unto Us a Boy Is Born), Of the Father's Love Begotten, and O Come O Come, Emmanuel. The piece is scored for wind ensemble, percussion and contrabass. It will be premired at Gordon College's Annual Christmas Gala Concert, December 2 and 3, 2005.

KANSAS STATE UNIVERSITY

Romeo and Juliet
Aldo Forte

The Kansas State University Symphony Band premiered Aldo Rafael Forte's *Symphonic Scenes from Romeo and Juliet* on May 3, 2005. The piece was commissioned by **Dr. Frank Tracz**, director of bands at Kansas State University with support from the Student Government Association, University Bands, and a grant from Kappa Kappa Psi/Tau Beta Sigma.

Mr. Forte gave master classes to the graduate conducting students, and guest lectured in the composition, conducting, and non music-major undergraduate courses. In addition, he met individually with the composition and master's conducting students. He also worked with the Concert and Symphony Bands on their interpretations of his music.

Since its inception, the Kansas State University Band Commissioning Project has commissioned pieces from composers Aldo Forte, Roger Cichy, Jay Gilbert, Eric Ewazen, Mike Mower, and David Maslanka.

SAINT MARY'S UNIVERSITY

The Saint Mary's University Concert Band, **Dr. Janet Heukeshoven**, director, is pleased to announce that Judith Lang Zaimont is the next recipient of the Kaplan Commissioning Project. Established in 1998, the SMU Band, with funding from the Sam and Helen Kaplan Foundation, commissions a new work for band by a Jewish composer based on Jewish thematic materials. The commission award is \$5,000. Past composers have included Steve Barnett, Lee Kesselman and Philip Rothman. The premier of Zaimont's new work will be during the 2006-2007 academic year.

ITHACA HIGH SCHOOL BAND COMMISSION

As part of it's June 2006 reunion, the Ithaca High School 1955-67 Band Alumni has commissioned Dana Wilson to write a 10-15 minute work for high school wind band/ensemble in honor of their high school band director, **Frank L. Battisti.** It is due in November 2006 and will probably be premiered at either Ithaca College or the New England Conservatory.

SCHULLER TO COMPOSE GRADE 3 BAND WORK

Gunther Schuller will compose a grade 3 band piece for the American Composers Forum's BandQuest project. Schuller will work with Jeff Leonard, band director, and students in the Lexington (MA) Public Schools in writing his piece. Premiere performance is scheduled for Spring 2006.

PETER CHILD COMMISSION

Sumbitted by Frank Battisti

Peter Child (Professor of Music and MacVicar Faculty Fellow at MIT) has been commissioned to write a 15 - 20 minute work for wind ensemble. It will be dedicated to Frank L. Battisti. Childs is currently Composer-in-Residence with the Albany (NY) Symphony. It will be available by December, 2006.
