## From the Podium

Dear Colleagues,

I am finishing this edition of *From the Podium* having just returned from the Athletic Band Symposium in Scottsdale, Arizona. Thank you to Jim Hudson and the outstanding staff at Arizona State University for hosting a terrific conference!

In the Spring *Report*, I suggested we are at a critical juncture in our profession. The many changes we are experiencing in our lives are the result of global tectonic shifts in wealth distribution, demographic changes, access to digital media, social networking and so on. The unprecedented magnitude of these changes is such that institutions and individuals are scrambling to make sense of a new world order taking shape before our eyes. It's as if the world has hit the 'reset' button.

The past several years have been challenging for institutions of higher education. Diminishing state budgets, smaller endowments, hiring freezes, furloughs, and reduced scholarships and assistantships have become the norm. Tuition increases are outpacing wages and non-resident tuition increases at state institutions are outpacing in-state increases. Some state legislatures have capped the number of hours that can be required for the bachelor degree. Schools of music are rethinking music education curricula to accommodate for declining resources, reduced credit hours in degree programs, and the changing demographics in our public schools.

Similarly, K-12 schools have had to function with fewer resources. Just as schools experience declining resources, there is pressure for better outcomes in math and reading. The result is that in many school systems, arts education is under attack or has been eliminated.

Arts institutions are reflecting the troubles being experienced in our schools and communities and these are largely the result of similar forces. In 2010-2011 several regional orchestras filed Chapter 7 bankruptcy (liquidation) including the Syracuse Symphony, Honolulu Symphony, and the New Mexico Symphony. The Louisville Orchestra and Philadelphia Orchestra filed Chapter 11 bankruptcy (reorganization) and the Detroit Symphony musicians took significant pay cuts.

As educational systems and arts institutions restructure

and reprioritize to reflect new realities, we must seek to understand and anticipate the new context for music education and the arts in our society. While exceptional high school, college and university bands and wind ensembles abound in all regions of the country, we must acknowledge our current secondary and higher education music curriculum serves only a small fraction of the student population. Many urban and rural students receive little to no music instruction and the curriculum often ignores developing the ability in students to listen intelligently and create their own music.

Arts Education in America: What the declines mean for arts participation (National Endowment for the Arts, Research Report #52: February 2011) is based on the NEA's Survey of Public Participation in the Arts and it reveals some troubling trends that warrant our attention.

While research shows that arts education is the strongest predictor of whether one will participate in or attend arts events, the percentage of Americans who reported receiving any childhood arts education has began declining since the early 1980's. Whereas 64.6% of 18 year olds in 1982 had received some arts education, by 2008 that number had decreased to 49.5%. And the reductions are not being experienced evenly across the population. While white students experienced minor reductions, Hispanic and African American students experienced declines of 40% and 49% respectively since 1982. In 2008 only 28.1% of Hispanic and 26.2% of African American adults 18-24 years old reported having received some arts education. Those statistics should be unacceptable to us!

#### 2 - FROM THE PODIUM

If there is an upside to the recent recession, it may be that it has unmasked weaknesses in our educational system and arts institutions that have been accumulating for many years, and the effects are being felt all the way to the top of our major symphony orchestras. Whether we will draw the right conclusions from these disruptions remains to be determined, but, as college band directors, we cannot deny that we are being affected. In fact, I would say that if the trend of the past 30 years continues, the health of our profession is in jeopardy. We are taking action!

#### **Music Education Initiative**

In December 2009 the CBDNA Board approved funds to subsidize three summer music education symposia in different regions of the country. The intent is to strengthen instrumental music education by combining our resources and expertise with institutions of higher education to provide high quality in-service workshops consistent with CBDNA beliefs in artistic excellence, creativity, and best pedagogical practices.

CBDNA funds enabled the University of Minnesota to reinstitute *The Art of Wind Band Teaching* in July 2010. Over 75 public school band directors from around the country and 20 senior music education students participated in sessions led by outstanding music educators, conductors, and composers. *The Art of Wind Band Teaching* will continue this summer with its own funding.

The Board selected Arizona State University as the site for the second subsidized workshop in June 2012 titled, *The School Band: A Radiant Source for Social Transformation, 2.0.* This will be a joint initiative between CBDNA, National Band Association, and the conducting, instrumental, and music education faculty at ASU. The symposium planned for 2012 will fuse together two initiatives: the NBA Young Composer/Young Conductor Mentor Project and a Symposium on Composing, Conducting, and Teaching open to a broader strand of wind band educators and music education students. The Symposium's primary objectives are:

1. To broaden and deepen participants' musical and pedagogical understandings through rigorous score study, work on conducting and rehearsal technique, and participation in instrument pedagogy sessions.

2. To cultivate in participants the ability to more creatively imagine an expanded, context-specific curriculum that purposely seeks to engage a wide swath of a school's population in music making and spur entrepreneurial thinking with respect to social engagement projects.

3. To inform participants about the relationship between music and brain processes and introduce to them

potential applications of that knowledge to curriculum planning, rehearsal techniques, enhanced educational outcomes, and advocacy.

It is our hope that the members of CBDNA will support the imperative for our organization to demonstrate leadership in the field of music education by working collectively to ensure that more children receive a music education, to provide mentorship for those who need and desire support, to broaden the curriculum to include musical experiences beyond re-creation of music, and to do our part to guarantee that instrumental music education is substantive, meaningful, and contextually relevant to students.

#### **CBDNA COMMITTEES**

So that CBDNA members can better understand the scope of what we are striving to accomplish as an organization, the remainder of *From the Podium* will focus on the work, charges, and goals of the appointed committees.

Music Education Committee: Gary Hill, Chair During the Athletic Band Symposium sponsored by Arizona State University in June this year, members of the CBDNA Music Education Committee met to discuss planning for the 2012 CBDNA Summer Music Education Symposium. Holding the meeting during the Athletic Band Symposium created opportunity for dialogue with CBDNA athletic band directors, an important constituency for the success of music education initiatives.

The committee believes CBDNA should have a strong role in the preparation and mentorship of music educators who are well grounded as musicians and pedagogues. The summer symposia have mentorship strands for senior music education majors and new members of the profession. Ongoing discussion needs to take place about ways in which CBDNA can better influence the preparation of future generations of music educators and provide them with ongoing support.

The following are the charges to the committee:

- 1. Investigate alternative approaches to instrumental music education across the country that have potential for enriching and integrating into school band programs as well as reaching out to students who would otherwise not participate in secondary instrumental music.
- 2. Assist with the development and promotion of the 2012 Summer Music Education Symposium.
- 3. Work with the CBDNA President to develop a music education strand for the 2013 National Conference.

- 4. Further develop the music education content for the CBDNA website and devise strategies for disseminating this information to the greater music education community.
- 5. Work with the Athletic Band Committee to devise strategies to promote and support balanced high school band programs consistent with the Statement on Music Education (see the CBDNA website).

Athletic Band Committee: David Mills, Chair In 2008 the Athletic Band Committee wrote *College and University Athletic Band Guidelines* to give members professional support through CBDNA for common issues affecting athletic bands, directors, and students. That work is continuing and expanding to include guidelines for tenure and promotion. In addition, the Athletic Band Committee has an important role in music education initiatives. Charges to the committee:

- 1. Work with the Music Education Committee to incorporate athletic band content into the 2012 Summer Music Education Symposium.
- 2. Develop equivalencies and norms for athletic band directors which can be useful measurements for tenure and promotion.
- 3. Work with the CBDNA President to develop topics for the 2013 National Conference.
- 4. Develop standardized procedures for the juried selection of presenters and for host site selection of the Athletic Band Symposium.

Gender and Ethnic Issues: Roby George, Chair The success of our organization to achieve ethnic diversity will largely be affected by whether underrepresented groups of students are provided the foundational education necessary to consider careers in secondary music education and higher education. In addition, the committee will consider how to broaden our membership and assure that CBDNA is welcoming of all members who share a philosophical view consistent with our Declaration of Principles. Charges to the committee:

- 1. Identify successful high school instrumental music/band programs which are comprised of primarily inner city or underrepresented populations of students that can inform the music education committee and CBDNA members of successful extant models which can be replicated.
- 2. Make recommendations to the Board about ways to incorporate non-participating members and past members into the activities of CBDNA.

- 3. Work with the Board and CBDNA historian to chronicle the history of minorities in CBDNA and the various projects, programs, and committees that came out of CBDNA's interest in addressing gender and ethnic issues.
- 4. Report to the CBDNA Board on the most recent HBCU Symposium that we supported with CBDNA funds.
- 5. Collect data to be presented to the Board: How is CBDNA doing with respect to ethnic and gender numbers? How comfortable and satisfied are minority members with the organization? Does CBDNA have higher or lower percentages of women members than the percentage of women high school band directors? What percentage of leadership positions in CBDNA have been held by women and minority members?

New Works Committee: Richard Clary, Chair The Commissioning Committee was decommissioned by the Board in 2009. The New Works Committee was formed this spring to pull together several CBDNA initiatives: the re-instatement of the Young Band Composition Contest, the continuation of the ASCAP/Fennell Competition, and the consideration of new creative projects which could include, but not be limited to, commissioning of new works. Charges to the committee:

- 1. Organize and adjudicate the Young Band Composition Contest and the ASCAP/Fennell Competition.
- 2. Recommend to the Board new creative projects that will advance wind bands and wind repertoire.

## **Small College/Community College Committee:** James Latten, Chair

The committee met in Seattle to discuss common issues of concern and is now in process of creating a document modeled on the Athletic Band Guidelines that will give professional support to members. Charges to the committee:

- 1. Develop a document that addresses common issues of concern and present to the Board.
- 2. Work with the other CBDNA committees on issues of mutual interest.
- 3. Revise the SCIB Handbook and submit it to the Board so there is full understanding of roles and processes.

#### **Final Thoughts**

CBDNA is an organization dedicated to the betterment of its members and the advancement of wind bands.

There are many ways in which these objectives can be achieved: some through initiatives that directly support members such as the *Athletic Band Guidelines*, some through ongoing efforts that strive to build a long term foundation such as the Summer Music Education Symposia, and some that give form to our philosophical principles such as those which endeavor to create and present new meaningful repertoire. Whatever your inclination, I hope you will use the above summary of activities as inspiration for adding your voice and ideas to the dialogue. We want to hear from you and we need your energy and ideas to forge a stronger future. The names of committee chairs have been provided so that you can be in direct contact with them about the issues that are most important to you.

I wish you all the best for the summer.

### On Campus
