FROM THE PODIUM

Dear Colleagues,

I hope you are having (or have had) a restful summer break. The summer months are an opportunity to recharge, reflect, and refocus on the upcoming year. I would like to use this forum to summarize some of the activity of our organization over the past year and bring you up to date on upcoming events and initiatives as we look ahead to our National Conference in Greensboro.

Just a few years ago our main efforts consisted of our national and division conferences and the annual conducting workshop. As those events continue to thrive, the addition of the Athletic Band Symposium and the Music Education Symposium give additional life and balance to our organization. Through the efforts of many we have the platforms to give form to our ideas, provide opportunity for continual professional development, influence the direction of the college band profession, and provide resources, ideas and leadership for high school and middle school music educators.

These symposia, combined with the content of our website and our ability to communicate via our listsery, provide us the capability to live out the Statement of Purpose we adopted in 2005:

"CBDNA is committed to serving as a dynamic hub connecting individuals to communities, ideas, and resources."

CBDNA Band Education Symposium

The crowning achievement for the Music Education Committee was a highly successful Band Education Symposium at Arizona State University in June. The BES served as a hub for bringing together practicing high school and middle school band directors from around the United States, college band directors, music education professors, university studio faculty members, undergraduate and graduate music education majors, composers, and leaders from CBDNA and NBA.

Each morning consisted of a plenary session on various topics followed by conducting sessions involving all attendees as participants or observers. Conducting participants received 10 minutes of daily podium time followed by 20-30 minute mentoring sessions with various CBDNA members. Augmenting the conducting portion were sessions throughout the day on score study, rehearsal techniques, repertoire selection, and discussions with composers.

In the afternoon, participants selected from a menu of topics that included:

*Uses of technology and social media to:

-foster musical creativity, facilitate instruction, and measure student achievement

-form social networks to crowdsource solutions to problems and share research -expand the breadth of music programs beyond the performance ensemble to engage other students through song writing, composition, music production, and sound engineering

*Using social engagement to:

-expand the reach of music programs beyond the classroom into the community -develop in students the ability to teach, lead, and organize

-augment student understanding and appreciation of other cultures

-develop student understanding and compassion for the less fortunate through service projects organized around music performance

- *Instrument pedagogy
- *Athletic band program development
- *Music administration

Six members of the Music Education Committee were able to attend, and they will be presenting two sessions at the National Conference summarizing the achievements of the 2012 Band Education Symposium and the 2010 Art of Wind Band Teaching as well as leading discussions on future music education initiatives. And, several additional CBDNA members attended as representatives of their divisions. Collectively, we have a strong nucleus of CBDNA members who can build on this experience to strengthen our presence in music education.

To further leverage the benefit of this important CBDNA initiative, many of the plenary and afternoon sessions were video archived. Once these are available, links from the CBDNA website will be provided to facilitate viewing and use in the music education classroom as well as

become available to band directors around the country.

Athletic Bands

The Athletic Band Committee in collaboration with The Ohio State University organized an outstanding Athletic Band Symposium to coincide with the 10th Anniversary of the founding of the Athletic Band Symposium at OSU and the retirement of Jon Woods. Over 200 members were in attendance and the Ohio State faculty and staff members were superb hosts. This being the third Athletic Band Symposium I have been able to attend, I continue to be inspired by the dedication, energy, organization, and innovation from members of this part of our profession.

One of the most important sessions relevant to all of us was a thought provoking and timely discussion on hazing. Leading the discussion were David Westol, a former Assistant Prosecuting Attorney from Kalamazoo, Michigan and frequent consultant for fraternities, sororities, and sports organizations on the issue of hazing, Alan Bonner, National Executive Director of Kappa Kappa Psi/Tau Beta Sigma, Dr. Malinda Matney, Senior Research Associate for the Division of Student Affairs at the University of Michigan and Past President of KKY, Dr. Tony Falcone from the University of Nebraska, and Derrick Mills, Past President of KKY. discussion centered on root causes of hazing. ways to identify hazing in the early stages of development, and strategies for avoiding and eradicating hazing.

The Athletic Band Committee has developed procedures for the juried selection of presenters at the Athletic Band Symposium and National Conference; moving one step forward in assisting our members in the development of their tenure and promotion credentials. In addition, the Committee has developed criteria for host site selection for future symposia. The CBDNA Board will work with the Athletic Band Committee to place the criteria on our website

where it can be viewed by all members. The Athletic Band Symposium will be held at the University of Oklahoma in 2013 and the University of Virginia in 2014. Selecting sites two years in advance will assist in the planning of future Athletic Band Symposia.

Gender and Ethnic Issues

One of the communities under-represented within CBDNA is the directors of Historically Black Colleges and Universities. Several years ago the HBCU directors formed an organization called the HBCU National Band Directors Consortium. The HBCU NBDC holds an annual conference in Atlanta and the CBDNA Board approved funds each of the past two years to assist these directors in the running of their conference. There is a rich tradition of bands at these institutions that adds to the tapestry of the college band profession, and our desire is to have a working relationship with the directors of the HBCU.

To assist CBDNA in building the bridges that will enable our respective organizations to work together, the chair of the CBDNA Gender and Ethnic Issues Committee, Roby George, attended the HBCU NBDC Conference. In addition to attending sessions, Roby met with directors from the HBCU to better understand their needs and concerns. A feature of the HBCU NBDC is the emphasis on providing their students with enriching musical experiences at their conference.

Upon returning from the conference, the CBDNA Gender and Ethnic Issues Committee discussed with the CBDNA Small and Community College Committee about having a targeted campaign to invite HBCU directors to nominate their students for the Small College Intercollegiate Band. Many of the HBCU schools share similar challenges with small and community colleges and the SCIB is an important opportunity for students of these schools to receive an enriching musical experience while expanding the network between college age musicians. After discussion this initiative will move forward, and an invitation

will be sent to HBCU directors to encourage them to nominate their students for the CBDNA SCIB in Greensboro.

Small and Community Colleges

One of the challenges in the past has been defining what constitutes a "Small College" for the purpose of nominating students for the SCIB. There are many defining factors beyond school size (though that is one factor to consider) that makes classification difficult. To better meet the intent of the SCIB to provide students from institutions that may not be able to compete for performance spots at national and division conferences, the CBDNA Small and Community College Committee has effectively worked out a Mission Statement that defines criteria for nomination of students. The Mission Statement is posted later in this issue of the CBDNA Report.

The Committee continues to develop a three-part survey that will be circulated to small and community college directors to inform the Committee about the specific qualities, needs, and challenges of small and community colleges. The Committee intends to use this information to develop some norms and recommendations (similar to the Athletic Band Guidelines) for directors to use to promote their programs with their administration.

Research

Patrick Dunnigan has been heading an initiative to reactivate the Research Committee. Members of the committee have been selected after careful review of credentials. The Research Committee has been charged with reviewing research proposals and papers for the National Conference and reinstating the CBDNA Journal in electronic format after a twelve year hiatus.

The process for submitting proposals for presentations for the National Conference was sent to members in May via the CBDNA listserv and can also be found later in this Report as well as located through the link on the CBDNA

website to the 2013 National Conference. The process for submitting research articles for the CBDNA Journal will be revealed by the Research Committee in the fall and we anticipate publication in January 2013.

Other Initiatives

The CBDNA/ASCAP Frederick Fennell Prize will be adjudicated this fall and the winner will be announced at the CBDNA Forum in Chicago. The winner will receive a cash prize of \$5000 and a performance by a prominent university wind ensemble. Contest rules are included later in the Report. Please circulate this information to your contacts.

The Conductor Health Issues Committee will be circulating a survey to help us learn about the occupational hazards we face as conductors and assist in developing strategies for avoiding health problems. Please take a few moments to complete this survey once you receive it via our listsery.

CBDNA National Conference

Finally, I would like to write a few words about the National Conference at the University of North Carolina at Greensboro, March 20-23, 2013. Our National Conference is our largest effort that unites all of our members and brings forth the best ideas and performances from all corners of our organization. It is here where our greatest energy and inspiration for the future accrues, where friendships are renewed, and where we can discuss and debate ideas in a fashion that cannot be replicated through our electronic media.

An outstanding slate of performance ensembles has been selected, and though it is premature to reveal finalized programming decisions, the preliminary glimpse of what we can expect is impressive. While performances may be what many CBDNA members most look forward to at our conference, it is only part of the equation for a successful gathering.

The full power of our organization is revealed when our best performers, teachers, researchers, and thinkers offer their talents to our members. With an outstanding host and performance ensembles having been chosen, our next step in putting together the National Conference is the submission proposals of for research presentations and poster sessions. Please consider what you have to offer and if you have important information and ideas to share, I encourage you to submit your proposal to Steve Peterson by September 14, using the guidelines for submission found later in the Report.

As you can see, we have a very active organization of dedicated members performing meaningful work in many areas of the profession. When one ponders the scope of our collective activity, depth of our ideas, and energy and passion our members put forth in the belief in what they do, it is humbling to serve as a leader of our fine organization.

SMALL COLLEGE INTERCOLLEGIATE BAND

MISSION STATEMENT: The general spirit and mission of the SCIB is to provide students (music majors and non-majors alike) from band programs at smaller colleges and iniversities, community colleges of any size, and Historically Black Colleges and Universities of any size the opportunity to perform high quality literature at the CBDNA National Conference under a renowned conductor. As it is much less likely that wind bands from these institutions may ever be selected for regional or national CBDNA performance slots, the SCIB was conceived to give these students the opportunity to play advanced literature (repertoire that their home institutions may never be able to program) at a national convention under a renowned conductor. The SCIB makes it possible for talented students

from institutions lacking instrumentation, student resources, and/or financial resources, to gain an unforgettable musical experience commensurate with those gained by members of ensembles selected to perform at CBDNA National and Division Conferences.

In general, eligibility is intended for students from <u>any</u> community colleges; <u>any</u> 4-year universities with fewer than 5000 studentsⁱ, and <u>any</u> HBCU institutions. In all cases it is expected that the home band program reflects the qualities stated above and that the nomination fulfills the general spirit and mission of the SCIB.

Directors from four year institutions that exceed 5000 students are invited to nominate students if they believe their home school programs currently reflect the qualities of a program as noted in the mission statement above, since there are many valid extenuating circumstances in college band programs at larger schools. Directors should briefly explain any extenuating circumstances that merit consideration. The chairperson of the Small College Intercollegiate Band, in consultation with the chair of the Small College/Community College Bands Committee and the President of CBDNA, will make final decisions.

According to data vetted by the Small College/Community College task force in 2010, approximately 70% of all colleges and universities (excluding trade schools) in the USA have less than 5000 students.

COMMISSIONS AND PREMIERES

Mercury on the Moon by Scott McAllister was premiered by the Pacific Lutheran University

Wind Ensemble on March 13, 2012 in Lagerquist Concert Hall, Tacoma, WA, and on March 15, 2012 in Nightingale Concert Hall, Reno NV. The work was written for and dedicated to the PLU Wind Ensemble and their conductor, Edwin Powell, and featured tenor and guitar soloist James Brown.

Mercury on the Moon is a "concept" symphony for wind ensemble. Like a concept album, each element of this work contributes to an overall theme or story. Fear and the hate that generates from fear is the apex of this large work for the wind band. I have discovered that throughout my own life experiences and observations that most of the destructive forces in human culture stem from fear. In this work I use some examples of text and music that I have created to weave a path through fear and hate in hopes of illuminating and igniting conversations and awareness.

Mercury is the cantor or messenger for the entire composition. The inspiration of epic concept albums like Pink Floyd's Dark Side of the Moon, and the haunting wide range of Freddie Mercury's (Queen) voice and the mythological Mercury who was a messenger who wore winged sandals inspired the title of this work. The image of Mercury helplessly standing on the moon watching mankind destroy itself with fear and hate is the central concept of this work.

Prelude introduces the main images to this composition. Religions are introduced in a collage of textures in this prelude and in other movements. Muslim prayer calls, Jewish Shofar, and Christian and satanic masses are woven throughout the prelude.

Censored is inspired by my own experiences with groups of the recent past who banned books, poems, music, authors etc. where I grew up in the south. Banned books based on race, homosexuality, historical and cultural meanings empowered these mostly religious organizations. But the fear of understanding things that are not like themselves perpetuate the hatred toward the creators.

What They Call Me is a story of a young man sent to a "pray the gay away" program and deals with the intolerance to homosexuality. The son is singing to his father asking for an unconditional, Agape love only to find himself falling into a deep state of depression and eventually suicide. This movement text paints an image of death by using the downward motive of Dido's Lament. Each chorus the tenor sings longer durations until all breath is gone.

DISSERTATION/TREATISE ABSTRACTS

Five Songs After Texts by Friedrich Rückert: A Transcription for Wind Ensemble – Dennis Llinás

Submitted in partial fulfillment of the requirements for the Doctor of Musical Arts degree in Conducting at The University of Texas at Austin, 2012.

The summer of 1901 was an important time period in the compositional development of Gustav Mahler. It was at his summer home in Maiernigg that he composed some of his most performed works including his 4th Symphony, 5th Symphony, and most of the songs from the Rückert-Lieder. Although Mahler composed seven songs based on texts by Friedrich Rückert, the five most commonly performed and recorded works have become an informal cycle now known as the Rückert-Lieder. With the exception of "Liebst du um Schönheit," Mahler composed each of these 5 songs for voice and piano, and immediately orchestrated them for voice and "Um Mitternacht," however, was orchestra.

uniquely scored for voice and orchestral wind section--a factor that incited my interest in this project.

This document provides a brief look into the genesis of the Mahler's work, followed by a detailed account of orchestration decisions from selected passages in my wind transcription. Each chapter begins with a translation of the text, comparison of the instrumentation, and a highlight of the most significant orchestration decisions. Choices for the transcription are explained on a movement-by-movement basis and topics of color, transparency, and text reside at the highest priority. This project was important to me not only because it presents the opportunity to have a complete collection of songs by a significant composer for wind ensemble, but because it provides an additional work that promotes collaboration with a vocal soloist. It is my hope that this collection, or selected songs from the collection, will make their way into concert programs for wind ensembles.

CALL FOR PAPERS AND PRESENTATIONS

The College Band Directors National Association is pleased to invite papers and presentations by scholars engaged in research and pedagogy related to wind music, conducting, and athletic bands for its National Conference at the University of North Carolina at Greensboro March 20-23, 2013.

Submissions may explore any aspect of wind music, conducting, teaching music at the college level, wind instruments, athletic bands, or other topics of interest to an audience of college band and wind ensemble conductors.

General Guidelines

Presentations are welcome from any scholar actively engaged in music research, conducting, or pedagogy related to wind bands. Presentations may be either major presentations or poster sessions and scholars of all stages of their academic careers are encouraged to submit work for consideration. Major presentations are expected to be completed work covering significant new aspects of scholarship. Poster session presentations are intended for work-in-progress, or as summaries of existing scholarship.

Each major presentation will be allocated 50 minutes for presentation and questions; poster sessions will be allocated 20 minutes. Presentations may include audio/visual media.

Proposals

For consideration, please comply with the following:

- A. Papers submitted for presentation must be the original work of the author(s). Proposals should include a statement of the paper's original contribution to scholarship as well as a summary of the paper's methodology and specific evidence of results.
- B. There are no limitations as to the type/scope of research submitted for consideration including quantitative studies, qualitative studies, historical studies, and theoretical analyses.
- C. Papers and presentations given at prior conferences will be considered if the audience was substantially different (e.g., state convention, university symposium). A statement specifying particulars of the presentation must be included with the submission.
- D. Proposals should be no more than four double-spaced pages of text (approx. 1000 words) including footnotes. Musical examples need not count toward this limit.
- E. An abstract of 150 words, suitable for publication in the conference program should be included.

- F. A cover letter with the title of the paper/proposal, author's name, address, phone number, and e-mail address should accompany the submission. The proposal and abstract should NOT include the author's name or institution.
- G. Submissions must be submitted electronically to Steve Peterson at: speterson@ithaca.edu and received by 11:59 p.m. Eastern Time, September 14, 2012 for consideration.
- H. All submissions will be screened by a panel of qualified evaluators.
- I. Applicants will be notified of the evaluator's decisions by November 1, 2012.

Athletic Band Submissions

Athletic band submissions for presentation at the National Conference should be sent to Steve Peterson for collection, and will be adjudicated by members of the Athletic Band Committee or those designated by the committee. There will be a separate call at a later date for submissions that are to be considered ONLY for the summer 2013 Athletic Band Symposium.

Submissions for consideration at the National Conference that are not selected will automatically be considered for the Athletic Band Symposium *if requested* by the presenter at the time of submission.

A call for juried video half-time show presentations at the National Conference will occur at a later date in the fall semester.

Selected Presenters

The following will be required of presenters selected by the juried process to present at the National Conference:

1. Presenters must be active members of CBDNA current in their dues at the time of submission and at the time of

- presentation, and must be registered for the conference.
- 2. The CBDNA Board may consider outside proposals from prominent and renowned specialists outside the college band profession without the requirement of CBDNA membership. In such cases, the Board will consider the importance of the topic to CBDNA members, background and credentials of the presenter, and the ability of the presenter to relate their topic to the college band profession.
- 3. Presenters must travel to the National Conference at their own expense. There is no monetary assistance provided by CBDNA.
- 4. Presenters will be expected to conform to time limits. SET UP TIME FOR AUDIO/VISUAL AIDS WILL BE INCLUDED IN THE TIME ALLOTMENT.
- 5. Presenters will be required to bring 3 copies of the complete presentation to the National Conference for the purpose of archiving the conference proceedings.
- 6. Presenters are responsible for having copies of handouts for distribution at the presentation.
- 7. Presenters are responsible for requesting audio/visual needs from the host by January 15, 2013.

PURPOSE:

ASCAP and the CBDNA seek to recognize talented young composers 18–30 who write for Concert Band. The winning score will be announced at the CBDNA Forum at the Midwest Clinic on December 21, 2012 and will be guaranteed a live performance by a prominent college band selected by the CBDNA.

DEADLINE:

Submissions must be postmarked no later than October 15, 2012.

ELIGIBILITY:

Open to citizens or permanent U.S. residents, or enrolled students with student visas, who are between the ages of 18 and 30 by January 1, 2013. Only one entry per composer may be submitted. Previous winners of the ASCAP/CBDNA Frederick Fennell Prize are ineligible.

APPLICATION PROCEDURES:

Applicants must submit a completed application form, a reproduction of one manuscript or score; biographical information listing music studies, background and experience, and a list of compositions to date.

Complete submission must be labeled ASCAP/CBDNA Band Directors Prize, postmarked no later than October 15, 2012, and mailed to Cia Toscanini, ASCAP, One Lincoln Plaza, New York, N.Y. 10023.

Please include Self-Addressed Envelope with sufficient return postage (SASE).

SUBMISSION OF COMPOSTIONS:

- Only one composition per composer may be submitted. Only original music will be considered. Arrangements are ineligible.
- The score reproduction submitted must be legible, bear the applicant's name and be reproduced by an accepted reproduction process. Only copies or reproductions should be submitted. The applicant should hold the original score.
- CDs of the composition submitted are welcome, but must be clearly marked with the composer's name, title of the composition, identification of the Concert Band performing, and properly cued.
- All scores and CDs shall remain the property of the composer. If you wish materials to be returned, the entry must be accompanied by a Self-Addressed Envelope with sufficient return postage (SASE).
- Proper care will be taken to protect all music materials submitted, but each applicant releases all persons connected with this competition (including members of the Selection Committee) from any claims resulting from possible loss and/or destruction of scores/CDs/materials submitted.

ADJUDICATION:

The names of the Selection Committee of Band Directors and Composers will be made public on or before December 15, 2012, when the prize winner is announced.
